#### FROM WINNIPEG

Constable Bruce Day, of the Winnipeg Police Department, works for the Lord in a bold and unusual way. His methods were described in a full-page newspaper article: "Officer of the Lord" (Winnipeg Free Press, Sunday, May 21, 1989).

The article tells of a trailer which is parked at Winnipeg's inner-city corner of Martha Street and Henry Avenue. A photograph shows Bruce sitting at the front of the trailer near a large sign which declares, "Love Lives Here." During some of his off-duty hours, since 1985, Bruce and other Christians have been giving away coffee, doughnuts, and the good news about Jesus our Saviour. Among the visitors are drunks, drug addicts, and prostitutes -- the same people who may at other times need to be arrested. The Officer makes reference to Romans 13 and has no qualms about making arrests as God's servant to do good.

A few transformations have been seen. One story, mentioned in the article, was about a prostitute and her boyfriend, both drug abusers. After accepting Christ as Saviour and Lord, they conquered their drug problem. Now married, together they study the Bible and do volunteer work for the physically handicapped.

Bruce told us in a letter that the article contained some misquotes. A rebuttal explaining the specific problems appeared in the June, 1989, issue of <u>Blueprint</u>, the publication of the Winnipeg Police Association. Even so, our brother writes, "I am happy to say most people that approached me regarding the article were very supportive, especially the senior officers." He also warns that a "prepared statement" would probably be best when speaking to the press.

Although the misquotes were troublesome, the main message was loud and clear. Was God glorified? Indeed He was! We look forward to hearing from Constable Day again and thank God for the courage given him in his service as an Officer of the Lord.

#### FROM WEST GERMANY

The following is written on a post card sent to the <a href="Peacemaker">Peacemaker</a> from West Germany: "Dear friends -- The Christian Police
Association, Germany, wants to present you this new information."
(With the postcard is a pamphlet entitled "Christliche Polizei
Vereinigung.") "An English translation is enclosed. We wish to establish a connection with the <a href="Peacemaker">Peacemaker</a> and with Christian police officers all over the world. The German Chairman for foreign countries will be:

Here is the above mentioned translation of the pamphlet: The Christian Police Association is a registered union and activities are beyond any confession. This association is recognized as a non-profit organization.

Dear friends! During our daily police service, we may sometimes be faced with situations which are hard to overcome. We are expected to find always the correct words but it often makes us speechless. We are expected to act always in the right way but we feel out of sorts. But should we show feelings? Could we learn at all to help other people in situations in which we are overcharged ourselves? ...

In public, our reputation is often hurt; that doesn't make our work easier. We cannot and do not like to discuss personal problems. Sometimes we have the impression that our own problems diminish if we refer to those of others and this does at least relieve our minds. At home everything should then be in perfect order and we can hardly explain our real feelings.

#### Is life not more meaningful than this?

Therefore we want to talk to each other in small groups about those problems which are bothering us. Many things can be discussed more personally and frankly in an unstrained circle. The Bible has given, to quiet some of us, a clear concept for reality of life and they found out that the word of God is an important statement even for our police service. We and our families from all over the Federal Republic of Germany meet to

attend seminars with interesting reports and also spend together free weekends in a relaxed and harmonious atmosphere. We want to improve relations between citizens and police by showing movies in police stations, schools, and churches. We support police pastors taking care of our colleagues. We also like to look across frontiers through our international contacts to Christian police associations of other countries.

We are Christians of various confessions and communities and, as well, we are federal and German state police officers. A strange mixture isn't it? But this is only the external impression. Our confession in Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is our common link. He is the only One who can end the separation of mankind from God and only He can reinstate the original community. The Bible means for us more than void words. It conveys to us a faithful prospect for our own life. It is our aim and desire to realize our confession in Jesus Christ even in our profession and to convince other people to join us. We should not only talk on Christian values, but they should become visible where people have to live and to cooperate with people. This is a challenge for everybody who calls himself a Christian.

We are happy to see Christians proving their faith in their daily police work, not running away. Only in this way will others have the chance to think over again those questions which they have, properly speaking, forgotten a long time ago. It would be a great advantage if Christian faith could again become a topic of conversation.

Wolfgang Schypkowski, special officer at headquarters in the city of Delmenhorst says, "It is important for me to have the Bible as the basis for my faith and life. The Bible gives me certainty of eternal life and influences my thoughts and actions in private life as well as in service. Within the Christian Police Association, I have the opportunity to discuss with colleagues faith and its application in the police service."

A very disturbing trend has occurred within the Fellowship of Christian Peace Officers over the last two or three years. Chapters that once were very active have become dormant, or have folded completely.

When presidents or executive members are asked why, the usual response is: "People stopped coming due to lack of interest." or "The members are too busy in their own churches."

Let's look at the first response for a moment: "People stopped coming due to lack of interest." Think back to when your chapter or group got started. There was enthusiasm and excitement. People were encouraged to attend. Then what happened? The numbers started to taper off. But is that reason to call it quits? Sometimes in our own chapter only two or three show up. Is that time for despair? Certainly not! We pray about the next meeting and we make some phone calls. Then, the next week, maybe fifteen or more may come. Perhaps the lack of interest stems from us leaders, not the members. Just think how much work goes into planning a fishing trip or a hunting trip. Should we not put as much effort into an F.C.P.O. meeting or event? Paul said, "And whatever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus ..." (Col. 3:17). Perhaps we need to evaluate why the F.C.P.O. exists, and the reasons for getting together.

Now let's look at the second response: "The members are too busy in their own churches." (They can neither get involved in this ministry, nor can they attend even **one** meeting.) Many of us are busy in our churches and in the Lord's work, but if we don't reach our fellow officers in law enforcement, then who will? Many members of the law enforcement profession are reluctant to go to a minister or counsellor when they need help, because they feel that "outside people" don't really understand. They would rather go to a work-mate, someone they feel "has it all together."

This year, your chapter, despite poor attendance, may introduce someone to the One who can solve the deepest problems and concerns of life. Would that not make persistence worthwhile?

Ask God to make you an effective witness among the people at your part of the earth. Don't give up or even think of quitting, but press on!

#### DON'T BE DECEIVED!

What is happening in the world today? Should I be concerned and how can I really know or understand what is happening in this complex world?

Before I committed my life to Christ, it didn't really matter what happened. You see, I did what I wanted, when I wanted, how I wanted, because I believed that life was too short to be concerned. I made the best of it as quickly as I could, even at the expense of others.

In the context of man's philosophies regarding the meaning and purpose of life, I pondered several statements I had heard. One of the questions I asked myself was: Have I been deceived? The answer was a resounding "Yes". Now I ask you: Have you been misled?

Here is an example: Have you not heard that "man is becoming more advanced"? Well, it is obvious that man has more knowledge, but is he not becoming more and more corrupt and sinful, especially in these times? In 2nd Timothy 3:1-4, I read: "But realize this, that in the last days difficult times will come. For men will be lovers of self, lovers of money, boastful, arrogant, revilers, disobedient to parents, ungrateful, unholy, unloving, irreconcilable, malicious gossips, without self-control, brutal, haters of good, treacherous, reckless, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God ..."

#### TRADING PLACES

Dr. John Bunting shared this story at a gathering in Toronto several years ago.

There was a prominent economist, a gifted speaker, who was in much demand as a lecturer. He usually sat in the rear seat of his auto and rehearsed his speeches as his uniformed chauffeur drove him to the destination of his speaking engagements.

On one such trip to a small town, he was in the back of the car going over his speech when the chauffeur commented that he had heard the speech so often, he himself could probably give it word for word. The lecturer was tired from a busy schedule and said, "That sounds like a good idea. No one here knows me or has seen me, and I'll never be back here again, so let's swap places." They exchanged clothes, traded places, and proceeded to the lecture hall.

The chauffeur was welcomed as the famous economist and gave the speech remarkably well. He did so well, in fact, that he finished the speech in 21 minutes instead of the usual half hour. The chairman thanked him and suggested that maybe he would be willing to spend the remainder of his allotted time in answering questions.

The first questioner arose and presented a problem regarding the GNP. A complex mathematical formula was required to answer the question, and the imposter was momentarily taken aback. Then, he responded, "I am surprised that such an elementary question would be asked by anyone in such a group of distinguished economists. In fact, it is so easy, I will let my chauffeur answer it.

We, as peace officers, face many complex situations during our careers. Those of us who are Christians, can turn to God for help and guidance. He is not only able, but He is willing to provide the answer we cannot come up with in "the natural". (See James 1:5.) What a bonus to a peace officer to have immediate access to the best and most expert "back up" there is (Jer.33:3)! Too many times however, we "trade places" with God, thinking we are capable enough to take command and run our own lives. Before long, we start tripping and falling over the rocks of "self" as (Continued on Page 16)

Whenever I "changed places," it did not take too long before I had to swallow my pride and, like the chauffeur, turn to the Expert for the answer. ### **Testimony**

#### THE HORNET

The following article appeared in the  $\underline{\text{News \& Views}}$ , official publication of the Metropolitan Toronto Police Association, in October, 1988:

Retired Staff Sergeant Jack Turner is the newly elected President of our Toronto FCPO Chapter. He is remembered by many as "The Green Hornet," a man with a great propensity for riding motorcycles -- not for reading the Bible.

So why did Jack become our President? You'll see in these excerpts from an article which he wrote in May, 1988. He begins, "I was sitting, reading my Bible this morning when I came across a passage which deals with a pastime many of us have these days, that of making money." He quotes from James 4:13-15:"Now listen, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money.' Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes.

Instead, you ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that.'"

Having called our attention to this passage, the President tells us why it means so much to him: "Like everyone, I tried to plan my retirement but courses on this were just beginning. We had purchased a brand new 1981 Pontiac Parisienne Brougham, fully loaded, and away we went to Florida for a five month vacation in the sun. I was in great spirits and in perfect health, even after all those years on the Force, but things did not come off as planned. I was playing tennis every day when I developed a sore throat that wouldn't go away. After a specialist looked down into the throat, he detected cancer. He said, 'You will have to act on this fast.' After I got my breath, I phoned my doctor at home and he said, 'Come home right away.'"

At the end of thirty-five years of **police service** (twenty-four on motorcycle in all kinds of weather), Jack began his **Christian service**. In the struggle with cancer, both he and his wife accepted Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

Today, after many radiation and chemotherapy treatments, "The Hornet" reports that he is in remission. Though he still suffers from lingering effects of the disease, he continues to do great work for the FCPO as the inspiring and energetic new President. He is happy in a retirement he did not anticipate. "If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that." Jack refers again to this passage in the concluding lines of his article: "Life took on a new meaning for me and my wife, Laura, and that is why I take so much of what I was reading this morning into consideration when I plan something."

### Recipe Corner

#### CREAMY RAISIN PIE

6 tbsps. sugar

2½ tsp. cornstarch
½ tsp. nutmeg

1 can raisin pie filling
3 eggs separated
1 cup sour cream
1-10" baked pastry shell
4 tbsp. sugar

In medium saucepan blend sugar, cornstarch and nutmeg; stir in pie filling.

Lightly beat egg yolks and stir into mixture.

Place over medium heat and cook, stirring until mixture comes to a boil; simmer 2 minutes.

Remove from heat, cool; fold in sour cream and pour into prepared pie shell.

Whip the whites until soft peak form. Gradually add the sugar and continue to beat until meringue forms stiff peaks.

Spread over pie and bake in 425F. for 4-6 minutes until golden brown.


#### Poetry
