

#### God

There is one God. Holy, eternally existing and manifesting Himself to us in three persons. Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God is merciful and loves us, but is just and must punish sin (Exodus 34:7; Matt. 28:9; John 3:16; John 14:6,10).

#### Christ

He was supernaturally conceived, born of a virgin, was put to death by crucifixion under Pontius Pilot, was raised from the dead on the third day, and now sits at the Father's right hand whence He is coming again personally, bodily and visibly (Luke 1:26-35; 1 Cor. 15:3,4; Eph. 1:13; Eph 4:4,5).

#### Maly Spirit

The Holy Spirit is God, He indwells all believers having baptized them in the body of Christ at the time of regeneration (Rom. 10:9,10; 1 Cor. 12:13,14; Eph. 4:4,5).

### The Bible

The Scripture of the Old and New Testaments were verbally inspired of God and inerrant in the original writings and that they are the Supreme and final authority for our faith and life (2 Tim. 3:16,17; 2 Peter 1:20,21).

#### Grace

Eternal life is a free gift and cannot be earned. We are saved by grace and not by our own works (Rom. 6:23; Eph. 2:8,9).

#### Faith

All those who by faith receive Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Saviour, and who confess Him as such before their fellowmen become heirs of God and joint heirs with Jesus Christ (Rom. 8:16,17; Rom. 10:9; Eph. 2:8,9).

#### Man

We are sinners and that by His death upon the cross, the Lord Jesus Christ made a perfect atonement for sin, redeeming us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse in our place (Rom. 3:23; Rom. 10:9,10 John 3:18).

#### Judgement

Those who reject the love of God and the saving work of Christ will be judged and punished for sin. They will be eternally separated from God (Exodus 34:7; Psalm 89:32; (John 16:7-11; John 3:18; Jude 14:14).

orraine asked me if I knew Roy. Roy at the age of 52, died as a result of cancer. Then she said, "when you attend so many funerals and the people are in your age bracket, you realise how precious life is and the need to keep in touch with each

Is growing old and dying a problem for you? What makes absolutely no sense to me is dying young. As a young boy I wanted to do things older boys did. Now I know that getting old happens fast.

I am not in the position where I pick up the paper each morning and read the obituary section to find my name missing only to go back to bed, after a hearty breakfast.

I thought her statement was incomplete. I also know we would not agree on some issues about life, especially the question is He your friend?

Grief is something we all experience because statistics on death tell us that one out of one dies, but the greatest mystery must lie in the historical life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

To understand how to get the maximum benefit out of any car, stereo, T.V or appliance, we look at the instructions and follow the rules. The Bible offers us a set of rules that show us how to derive the maximum benefit out of life. But do we choose to follow these instructions?

Several facts exists. Jesus came and lived among His people. He was crucified and nailed to a cross. He died and was



buried. He rose from the dead. His tomb is empty. Many continue to deny Him these truths and more so, the words He spoke.

Jesus was the friend of Lazarus, (Jn. 11:43,45); the maiden in Mt. 9:25 and the young man in Lk. 7:14,15. He can be your friend if you trust Him. Jesus said; "I am the resurrection and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live" (Jn. 11:25).

enjoy reading the Peacemaker immensely, it is a great encouragement to me to read of fellow Christian police officers out there.

I work in a detachment of over 35 officers and I am not sure of one other Christian. Please pray that I may show Christ to these men and women by my words and deeds. Sometimes, I don't feel I'm setting the example that I should. I ask that in '93 I will be that light in a dark place. It's so easy to get caught up in foolish talk in the office. Often, I ask myself; "do they see Christ in me?"

I also want to be able to have a genuine love and concern for the souls of the lost.

I recall, just before Christmas, arresting a suspect in relation to a domestic situation and having to transport him to the local detention facility which in our case is about a 35-40 minute drive. This man may have been on the verge of a mental breakdown and comes from a mixed up childhood. Apparently, his parents gave him up when he was young and he was in foster homes. Since he has been in trouble with the law for the past few years, his foster parents do not want anything to do with him.

Instead of using that travel time to just listen to him and talk to him all I thought about was getting rid of him as soon as possible and getting back to get my paperwork done (as usual I was far behind).

I felt bad afterwards and had to ask God for forgiveness for my selfishness. I just want people to see Christ living in me and to be obedient to the Lord and use whatever opportunities are available wherever and whenever I can. Love in Christ

#### A view to CFCPO growth

our recent open letter to the CF-CPO membership stirred me to respond. As I submit my thoughts to you, please remember that I not only respect and enjoy your leadership and the fruits of same, I recognize the fact that you truly do seek member involvement (even at the risk of possible negative input).

My intent is to build you up in your leadership endeavour with a view to CFCPO growth.

I notice that you struggle with the same problem that your pre-

decessors did; namely, how do we stir our membership to <u>active</u> duty as opposed to <u>passive</u> commitment?

May I suggest that as mentioned in

Jeremiah, that you consider your sheep.

The CFCPO'S basic membership has a service focus. From day one every member (even at their swearing in ceremony) commits to the service of others.

Unfortunately, the focus of CFCPO has been much on membership, and chapter building, which in turn develops inner focus.

Although introspection is vital for growth, it should only be seasonal - not a staple diet. It also flies in the face of the "serve others" mindset already ingrained within Canada's law enforcement community.

For the most part, officers do not want to be the centre of attention; they are not comfortable with "self serve."

I believe that the resistance that you sense (and its real) is because you have not developed to potential this area of overt service which leads to my next thought:

#### remember your charter...

Written into the CFCPO vision mandate is a threefold objective: 1. Salvation of souls (Evangelism). 2. Teaching (Education).
3. Building up the CFCPO (Edification). Unfortunately, we as a body have for some time verbalized all three but our energies and efforts have proven that #3 has been our priority.

At this point, my mind is <u>full</u> of possibilities and potential for CFCPO as a local, provincial, national and even global outreach. I know that with some work, we can be absolutely amazed by God's moving within our midst.

However, a cautionary approach is necessary.

> At this point the CFCPO leadership must give serious thought to their visions.

> If it continues to be introspective, then growth will always be

a struggle and finances will be difficult to achieve. If, however, the leadership assumes the priorities of its own mandate and in the order as laid out, their growth

will be imminent.

In closing, may I suggest one more thing. I really sense that you have a mind set of humility and in order that leadership can operate most freely, your fellow CF-CPO leaders need same heart.

Humility will help you to seek out those in your membership that have the gifts you need to accomplish your goal of Evangelism, Education and Edification.

Art, I believe you are doing much that is right. I also believe that if the CFCPO leadership assumes the biblical mandate of "others first", then your personal efforts will have magnified effect.

This letter (if it seems negative) is meant only to be a catalyst for positive change. I also recognize that I do not have the bottom line and in no way do I feel that it is my way or no way.

If you as a leadership become interested in implementation of these goals, building your membership to a giving status, as increasing the service potential of CFCPO, I stand available (as I have to the two previous leadership) to assist on a consulting basis only, because with my own present commitment to ministry (High Adventure Ministries) my time is stretched.

As you consider these thoughts, consider also what I see as achievable goals for CFCPO.

#### SHORT TERM

Evangelism
Increased cash flow
Increased mailing list
Enhanced church community mind set
CFCPO counselling seminars for stress
Cable TV and line TV/Radio talk shows

#### LONG TERM

Team of developed teachers, that can travel for CFCPO to churches, seminars.

Team of developed evangelists to travel for CFCPO.

300-400% growth in mailing list.

An FCPO missionary to travel abroad for evangelism and chapter growth abroad.

Develop a resource library available to members and associates for personal and chap-

ter edification.

CFCPO seminars for variety of topics, ie marriage, stress, etc.
Radio outreach.

Just like your list, mine could go on, so I won't. However, my particular list growth is contingent on one fact: that evangelism be our priority - all else will follow, much like making a love commitment and having the feelings follow.

My suggestion is that when we develop an outreach mindset, the related body life ministries will begin to flow as each person begins to look for ways to reach out, putting to rest the need for us to search for helpers.

With that mindset will also come the finances which should help continue a larger cycle of outreach - inreach - support.








# CHRIST FOLLOWERS IN THE REAL WORLD GOTHON MacDonald (Oliver Nelson, 1991)

A Book Review

n his book, Gordon MacDonald looks at what it means to have what he calls a real-world faith. one which is relevant and sustaining in the marketplace (whether that is an office, a scout car, or the streets) as well as at home or church. He acknowledges that each of us is unique, and affirms our individuality in the way each of us follow Christ. Each of us has our own style which must fit us and which must make sense in both the private and public spheres of our lives. With his focus on uniqueness, he does not propose a hard and fast regiment for developing our faith (MacDonald likes to describe it as 'forging' a real-world faith - a reference to an analogy he uses early in the book). Instead, he looks at the factors which affect that faith and suggests ways to examine those aspects of our lives with a view to making changes that will bring us closer to God. In a nutshell, we need to learn about God, learn about ourselves (through the eyes of God) and then apply all of that knowledge to the real world.

The author expounds on the view that our faith is only as big as our image of God. If we have not made the effort to seek God, to learn about Him, to find out who He is, then we cannot begin to forge a real-world faith. He identifies 6 "languages of the inner spirit" that we use for meeting God and offers that while we may have a preference for one or two, we need to become familiar with all of them if we are to mature in our faith. Although some are seeming opposites, he shows that Jesus mixed all of them in a perfect balance. We need to

continually work on answering the question, "Who is my God", to develop our faith in Him.

In the following section, MacDonald coaxes us to look inwardly with Christ, to "explore and renovate" our inner space to develop a spirit of Christ-likeness within us. He warns that this is not an easy task; that although it can sometimes be painful it is a necessary step to building our faith. As we clean house and rid our inner selves of those things which are not pleasing to God we are cautioned, in light of Matthew 12:43-45, to replace the old habits or activities (or whatever) with new ones, that the old might not return "with seven other spirits more wicked than itself".

The author suggests four strategies for applying what we've learned about God and about ourselves - developing a life plan; determining what are our most important values in life in each of four areas - spiritual, relational, financial & vocational; seeking accountability and encouragement in our key relationships; and envisioning the way we want our life to be in its final decade (his own intention is to "FINISH STRONG!").

I found the idea of a life plan to be a particularly appealing one as I struggle to sort out and prioritize the demands and opportunities I'm presented with every day, and to try to decide on a general direction for my life. The exercise entails taking a systematic and objective look at our own past, present, strengths, weaknesses, likes and limitations with a view to understanding how all of that prepares us for the


kingdom contributions we can make today onward. Next, we try to write a brief mission statement - a sentence or two describing what we feel God is calling us to accomplish in our lifetime. Having then determined who and where we are and where we're going, we try to come up with a way to get there, a step by step process. Again, however, there is a caution. Just as Paul's plans were sometimes thwarted and had to be reworked, so too, we should look at this as an ongoing, rather than one time exercise, building in the flexibility needed to cope with changing or unforeseen circumstances.

Throughout the book the author examines the life of Daniel as an example for putting our faith to work in the real world of our daily lives. In one of the later chapters, he lists a number of "Weekday Kingdom Qualities" that Daniel exhibited and which we can apply to our own everyday situations. He also presents a list of questions which we can ask ourselves as we examine how we are faring at living out our faith. The book also includes a study guide with a list of questions pertaining to each chapter.

I would heartily recommend "Christ Followers in the Real World" to anyone who is earnestly seeking ways to build a faith which permeates every aspect of his or her life.

## WHAT IS PEACE?

eace: a state of quiet or tranquility; absence of civil disturbance or agitation; freedom or cessation of war or hostilities a treaty reconciling two nations; a state of friendliness; calmness of mind. - Concise English Dictionary

This definition, although widely used, offers Christians a limited understanding of peace. By defining peace as the absence of hostility, disturbance or activity, the true meaning of the word is obscured behind a set of worldly criteria. As well, it implies that something has been taken away or withheld, and this imparts a negative connotation to the word. One can submit scenarios that would meet the narrow definition - for example, the silent, lifeless aftermath of a nuclear holocaust but this could hardly be called peace. Yet there is another definition of peace for the Christian:

Peace: 1) wholeness, unity, harmony; 2) prosperity, health and fulfillment;

3) theologically, inner harmony and harmonious interpersonal relationships with others, made possible by a personal relationship with God. - Revell Concise Bible Dictionary.

This is quite a contrast to the earlier definition! An implied absence is replaced with the Eternal Presence of God, and the criteria for definition is expanded to include all of creation through a personal relationship with its Creator. The points of reference change from being outside ourselves to including the very depths of our being - and the beingness of others through Him from whence all beingness stems. There is also a shift from being passively impersonal to being actively personal and interpersonal. The peace of God, given freely as a gift of grace through our Lord Jesus Christ differs greatly from the false peace of the world. The difference was expressed by Christ when He said:

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." (John 14:27 NIV)

Let us ponder the Christian meaning of peace as it relates to our lives and especially our actions. We are called to be peacemakers and it is by the manifestation of God's peace in our lives, our homes and our communities, that we return it to Him, the Giver. In the words of Sister Marilyn von Waldner, we need to ask ourselves, "What return can I make?"


hope of it touching the hearts of those who are present.




