CHRISTMAS IN A RECESSION

oom and gloom is predicted for the Christmas "industry" again this year. Millions are out of work across our country, and even more will be unemployed by the end of the year if we once again cut down on our Christmas spending. We, for the most part, are the fortunate ones. We have jobs, and job security.

A TIME TO GIVE

Recently I've been studying the laws of the Old Testament. This exercise has reminded me once again of God's laws of stewardship. The Israelites were to be stewards of the promised land, and the first of every family, animals and crops were to be given back to God. There were many laws and directives given to those who had surplus, directing them to share with the poor. We are perhaps used to hearing the principles of stewardship taught within our churches as principles of tithing. But goes far beyond the principle of giving a tenth of our incomes to God and His work. The principle of stewardship indicates that we must share whatever we have with those who have a greater need than we ourselves do.

In 2 Corinthians chapter 8, verses 12 to 14, Paul is talking about an offering of money. His teaching here is an extension of the stewardship principles of the Old Testament. In our society today, financial stewardship is a very practical means of practicing stewardship, since most of us don't have cattle and crops from which to give. But there are many other ways we can share what we have with others. And remember that stewardship does not relate to a fixed percentage of our incomes. It has to do with us sharing what we have with those who have less than we do - and not keeping score.

Well, that was a rather lengthy introduction to the topic of Christmas in a Recession. But I have been struck with a fresh understanding of stewardship as I think of the fast approaching Christmas Season.

Christmas is a wonderful time of good will among most people, and of giving and receiving gifts. After all, we are celebrating the greatest gift of all - God's gift of His Son. I would challenge you, therefore, to look at sharing and giving in a new way this year. Generally, we have all that we need. When we need some essential of life, we go out and buy it. So when it comes time to select Christmas gifts for each other, we have a difficult time choosing something which will be of real value or benefit to the receiver. If we apply the principle of stewardship to Christmas, what will that do to our current practices of gift giving?

There are so many needy people around us these days. Let's look for ways that we can share what we have with some one in need, this year.

We usually consider Christmas to be a time to celebrate, if we're not too exhausted from the rush and anxiety of preparing for these celebrations. But should we be celebrating while so many around us are sad and unemployed this year? Yes!

A TIME TO CELEBRATE

When God gave Israel the laws by which they were to live, He also appointed many days of celebration throughout the year. The people were to cease from work on these days. There was a celebration of their deliverance from Egypt (Passover), a celebration of First Fruits (first of their crops), a celebration of Harvest, and the list goes on. (An example of these celebrations is given in Deuteronomy 16:1-17, 26:1-15) At these times the entire nation ceased from work, and feasted and worshipped God, and had a great party of celebration.

The principle of stewardship was also very apparent in these celebrations, however. The foreigners and slaves were included, and the rich and the poor celebrated together.

So we have a principle to be good stewards and share what we have with others in need. And we have a principle which supports celebrations, rather than considering them to be wasteful endeavors. How can we apply this to the approaching Christmas season?

Here are some examples of ways I've heard of others celebrating the Christmas sea-

son

- → All gifts must be made by the giver. This means that more love and care has gone into the gift than with a more expensive, purchased gift.
- → Donate some of your time to an Inner City mission for the distribution of food hampers. If possible, also participate in the delivery of some of these hampers.
- → Encourage your children to purchase a nice, new toy, and have them deliver it to a children's charity.
- ♦ One church I know of, rented a flat-bed trailer and towed it around their neighborhood, singing carols.
 - →Include others, who have no family or

friends, in your Christmas Day festivities.

→Instead of mailing Christmas cards, use that money to support a family in need.


These are just a few ideas. Personally, I have always liked the idea of a "Little House On The Prairie" type of Christmas, where each family member gave a gift to just one other family member, and Christmas was spent celebrating their love for each other, rather than bemoaning gifts that were the wrong size.

"A Change of Heart"

i from the Estevan gang once again! Thought we'd write again with news of another Testimony. "God is Great" and he keeps on proving his love for us time and time again. The following occurrence is just another example of how he works in our lives and comes through when the crunch is on.

On JUL 18 (92), I received a call-out request to assist Estevan RCMP Det. to search for a missing person. "Norm" is 72 years old and hales from Carnduff, Sask. Things were not going well for him. He had several strokes in the past, suffered from Asthma attacks, and severe depression. He often has a lack of oxygen to the brain and caries oxygen with him in his vehicle. He gets a feeling of paranoia sometimes and wants to get away from all people. Norm had an argument with his wife the night before and left home without telling her where he was going. She was very concerned about him and reported his absence to police. At about 6:00 a.m., he had been stopped by U.S. Authorities near the Canadian Customs Port of North Portal, Sask. Before they could ascertain his problem, he drove away from them and crossed back into Canada without checking with Canada Customs. A province wide alert was put over the air for Norm shortly afterwards.

At about 3:30 p.m., a farmer found Norm's vehicle abandoned at the end of an old road

allowance entering into a pasture area not far from the Souris River Valley. Norm had left his oxygen supply locked in the vehicle along with his shoes; he had wandered off somewhere.

Dave BOYCE (Estevan Det.) escorted me to the location of Norm's vehicle (approximately 10 km N.W. of North Portal). Here, we met with Csts. Lyle SOLES another CFCPO member and Dan GREGORASH from Cardnduff Det. Ben PRYSTAY and Kelly FALCONER were already there from Estevan Det. At approximately 6pm., my partner, police service dog "Timber", was ready for action and would be used in the search for Norm along with an RCMP plane.

Dave led us in a quick prayer before the search started asking God to help us in finding Norm. The general feeling was that he may have already sucummed by now without oxygen. We all took different directions and started our search on foot. Thirty minutes later, "Timber" used his God given nose and power of scent to find Norm laying face down in some buck-brush.

What shocked us most was that he was alive and sat up as "Timber" nudged him under his stomach. He was disorientated, but remembered his name. His subsequent comment of "I laid down and didn't think I would wake up again" was a sober reminder to us that Norm had planned not to ever come home again.

Norm was taken to Estevan Hospital and later transferred to Regina for further treatment but made it okay.

Afterwards, Ikept recalling how Dave had led us in prayer and God's promise as given in MATHEW 18 vs. 19-20. "Whenever two on earth agree about anything you pray for it, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three come together in my name, I am there with them." HE delivered on that promise - for Norm!

In the hospital, Norm stated that he realized that life is worth living afterall - he now

arly in 1982, members from the OPP, Durham and Metro Police Forces joined together for fellowship and study in the Word of God.

On August 19, 1992, at the residence of Lloyd and Dianne Tapp, our *Peacemaker* distributors, members of the Durham Regional and Metro Police Forces, their wives and children joined together again to discuss the possibility of forming a chapter.

It is 10 years and FCPO members are still praying for a chapter in the Durham Region, where approximately 800 peace officers work and reside. It was an answer to pray!

Members of the Toronto Chapter attended to give their support and encouragement but you had to be there to experience the mood and excitement in that house. It was good to have Dino Doria, founding member of the CFCPO, past National and Toronto president and his wife Lynn, there to say how it began. Dino, now a Sergeant with Metro Inter Community Relations Unit, believes that "it takes a cop to reach a cop." "When the FCPO began, I always believed that if God was in it, it would prosper, no matter who was leading it", he said.

Another long time member, Jim Sneep, a

Staff Sergeant with Metro Toronto, shared about the times when members came to his hospital bed and prayed for him. He remembers Norm Brown, a former Metro Toronto Police officer, now a professional counsellor, with his Bible in hand walking to the operating room with him.

He reminded us, that the FCPO should not be a replacement for our church but we should "not forsake Christian Fellowship."
"It should be the MOTTO for peace officers to reach officers and to encourage members to reach out in Christ's name." "It is most effective getting together, because we are vulnerable like anyone else." "Bare each others burden, support each other prayerfully, visit each other in the hospital. "Be a practical group because practical fellowship is the important thing."

Durham needs our continued prayer and support as obstacles will be placed to prevent this chapter from prospering. "For we are looking all the time not at the visible things but at the invisible. The visible things are transitory: it is the invisible things that are really permanent" (2 Cor. 4:18. J.B. Phillips).

So, "Let us by the name of our Lord Jesus





The water appears a vivid turquoise which is caused by a deposit on the submerged rocks. The water is clear, cold and refreshing.






LOGAN PASS →



Chief Mountain is an unusually shaped massive rock that appears to have been squeezed up by enormous pressures - like squeezing a wet bar of soap. Logan Pass is a huge vista with a continually dropping valley that disappears from view between the mountains.

How anyone can fully enjoy this majestic splendor without acknowledging our Lord as it's Creator has to lose the breathless beauty that one surrenders to God and Christ under those circumstances.

I have tried to capture this in sketches. Others have, on film and video, or in prose or poetry or in song or music. The end result is only man's futile expression, an attempt to communicate the impossible.

There are many words in Isaiah that try and compare our futility in describing our Creator God with the solidness and greatness of mountains. It was in the camp we stayed that a bear was shot with a tranquilizer gun and moved elsewhere. Grizzlies in Montana have forced black bears into town to forage for food. Recently, a black bear killed a deer in a back yard and a cougar did the same thing - both in daylight.

Paul reminds us in Romans that we are all without excuse for not worshipping the Creator because His creation declares Himself. He also says that not only we, but the whole of creation, groans for redemption.

A promise is given in Isaiah Chapter 11 and 65 about the beauty that can be expected on this earth when Jesus reigns.

"The wolf will live with the lamb. The leopard will lie down with the goat. The calf and the lion and the yearling together; and a little child will lead them. The cow will feed with the bear, their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. The infant will play near the hole of the cobra and the young child put his hand into the viper's nest. They will neither harm nor destroy in my holy mountain. For the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord. as the waters cover the sea" (Isaiah 11:6-9).

When this happens, maybe our present duties will be completed.

Now, beyond the present vista's and the glorious promises for the Christian's future, was the Fellowship of Law Enforcement Officers, their spouses and children. This encouragement is needed by us all and which so many of you beloved brothers and sisters missed.

Fall is now upon us and we are looking forward to an exciting schedule.



A Tribute

ack will be 73 years young on 2nd January, 1993. Born in the East end of Toronto he reminisces about riding motorcycles as a young teenager. Later in life as a young police officer he gained the reputation as the "Green Hornet."

Jack rode dispatch from Borden to Toronto before going overseas in

November 1941. He is a romantic guy who proposed by cablegram to his wife Laura. They are together after 45 years. Having purchased a brandnew 1981 Pontiac Parisienne Brougham, fully loaded they went to Florida for a five month vacation after his retirement.

It was there that a doctor detected cancer in his throat. His trip was cancelled and while returning home he asked these questions; "Why me?" "Have I not always looked after myself?" Friends shared their love with him and one man pressed into his hand a treasured item (a Pope's medallion) and he said: "Keep it Jack, it will do you good."

Admitted to the Toronto Western Hospital, on arrival from Florida, Jack's sister, a young pastor and friends prayed for him. He was given a 50% chance of recovery. He had faith that he would recover after several radiation treatments. Two ladies from a Pentecostal church hearing of Jack's health, prayed for him on their knees in his home. Was God melting this "cold, cold heart" of his, he thought?

A retired neighbor asked some advice about a police matter which, Jack took to Harold Bennett (retired S/Supt.). Harold thought he was in Florida and when he explained that he had cancer, Harold asked him to shut the door and said; "May I pray for you?" Jack was shocked and happy and replied; "Of course, that would be fine with me." Smothered by the love of so many people praying for him brought tears to his eyes as he left Harolds's office.

Harold invited him to go to church where he heard a sermon on "Backsliding." THIS WAS THE TURNING POINT IN HIS LIFE. Harold questioned Jack about his spiritual life and at 5:30 p.m. that Sunday afternoon, March 14, 1982, he realized what he was going to do for the rest of his life. He surrendered to God.

He is now able to thank God for allowing cancer in his life and has promised to serve Him during the rest of his journey on earth.

It has not been an easy life and not always a smooth road to travel, since becoming a Christian. Jack believes that it's much easier to think less of himself and a lot more about others because "the rewards pay off." His favourite scripture verse is from Proverbs 3:5-6 "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and lean not on

thine own understanding, but in all thy ways acknowledge Him and He will keep your paths straight."

The FCPO means a lot to Jack for he remembers when Sgt. Dino Doria and retired Metro Police officers Norm Brown and Jeff Williams visited him and welcomed him into "my new family." Jack has not missed too many meetings since; and has had personal input into the establishment of a chapter in Halifax/Dartmouth, where his daughter once lived.

Jack is the CFCPO Secretary and President of the Toronto chapter. He corresponds with anyone who writes to the *Peacemakes* and most of you who know Jack, are aware that you will not escape his fashion of getting you involved with the ministry of the CFCO; particularly, when it comes to saving a buck. He is a very busy man, he cannot rest unless Laura sees to it. He is always eager to tell anyone about the Lord and the importance of having eternal life. He finds time to visit and share his experience with officers who are chronically ill at home or in a hospital. He is always sharing and demonstrating his faith in Jesus Christ.

Jack is in remission for which he praises God. He says; "I will always go back for check-ups and I know what it is like to walk with 50 lbs. loss of weight, hair loss and poor blood circulation, but I thank God daily through prayer, for what He has given me to work with on His behalf."

Jack is an inspiration to us because of his dedication and commitment. Nothing will get in his way with the promise he made to serve his Lord and Savior.

Remember Jack and Laura in your prayers for health, strength and journeying mercies as they travel to Florida by car early January, where he continues the work of the CFCPO.

morning. Oh, I don't want to be bothering with this cop, he's crazy man, every time we send trouble his way, he comes in the name of Jesus."
"They run man", he says.

The best part of his life came after two years on the job. He was twenty three years. He suffered from high blood pressure which, frequently attacked him. His was under doctors care, he hardly slept and even taking pills would not help. In uniform one night while standing at a corner of 125th, "everything was the same" he said; "I felt a fear, a coldness." He thought he was going to die, he had a severe nose bleed, the blood was flowing to his hand, he cannot remember whether he was hallucinating but he would not turn himself in. "You don't quit man, not where I grew up"; "I saw two caskets in front of me, I thought I was in a funeral." "All of a sudden, a little black lady grabbed my hand and said; "Officer, what is the problem?" I looked at her and said; my father and my mother are dead" and she said; "Love, I understand." All this time, he would not let go of her hand. He had been with the bravest, he had seen it all but that night he said, "I felt defeated." He heard the lady say, still holding her hand, "officer, would you come with me"? They crossed 125th and went to Lenox Ave. when he saw a cross that said; "JESUS SAVES." Still holding on to his hand. he thought, "I am Italian, a catholic, not a great one" he admits, but he gave up on God and thought that Jesus was a good guy and God was out to get him. "That's the kind of attitude I had." He thought that "when you're a looser you're gonna go to hell and God can no longer love you, so if he was going to go to Hell." Then he said; "let me die and let it end." The lady asked him; "would you come into our church"? The war was on in his mind. "You can't go into that church, it's not Catholic." Then he had a revelation from God. "Is the Pope's nose bleeding"?

It was the extreme for him going into that church with people having tambourines and singing aloud, praising God in a language he did not understand. "You have to learn something and once in a while do a wiggle, it will do you good", showing his two step. "I remember when they opened the door one of the ladies was doing the chicken, I wouldn't let go of the ladies hand

because "that ladies hand was the love of God working mightily, breaking down strongholds." He saw the preacher preaching but did not hear a word that was spoken. Then he heard the lady say; "officer, Jesus loves you." "It was like something in my mind just unwound, Jesus loves me, my own mother could not love me, how can Jesus love me"? he thought. It was obvious he could not understand this and the lady said; "son go home and read your Bible."

He went home that night, and opened the Bible on page one and the first thing he saw was "Genius." He later found out that it was Genesis. "Ever since, I never had a nose bleed again."

He reminded us that we must preach the word in season and out of season because "you don't know who you are touching."

He recalls that when he was 14 years old, someone who was standing on a box at a corner street said to him "when you get saved read the Gospel of John." Nine years later, he read the book of John and there it was, John 3:16. He said, "I never heard a preacher preach it."

"God so loved the world, that he gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

But the key which unlocked the door for him was that "God did not send Jesus to condemn Mikey." "You see, I always thought I was condemned, that the way I grew up I was condemned and all my friends were condemned; "but through Him you might be saved and I saw the words God so loved me, and Jesus set me FREE that night."

This story is only an excerpt of a life story still unfolding and what a heart Mike has for police officers. He is the president of Cops For Christ Inc. Florida Chapter and travels considerably preaching and sharing about the Living Savior.

Pray for Mike and Ann that God would protect them and use them for His Glory, for they would not want it any other way.

What a conference! Praise be to God!!!
