od created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them...God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. (Gen. 1:27,31) It seems that centuries of male domination in the law enforcement profession is at long last being eroded. With agencies now reaching for a fifty-one percent female membership, the famed bastion of masculinity is crumbling like the Berlin wall. And that's not so

bad. After all, if God said it was good, then it was good. I mean he did say male and female didn't he?

But is there a cost here? On the face of it no, there isn't. Oh, I know there are the arguments about females taking maternity leaves but then don't the men get parental leave? Then some say females just can't cut the mustard in a face off. I can tell you I've seen some guys that couldn't tackle a church mouse and some women that could down a prize fighter in one blow. No, those type of arguments just don't hold water. There are strong women and there are weak women. And there are strong men and a whole lot of weak men too. So, what is the cost?

We had the privilege to meet with Bonnie Reilly, an ex cop who now works in a women's ministry. In a short conversation over lunch, Bonnie gave us a whole different perspective on women in policing.

She told us that during her years with the RCMP she worked U/C in the drug squad. It had become her dream to be a police officer. A character building profession where she was determined to be just as good as the next guy. Well, why not. After all, during her early school years — and later in University, she had been told enough times that she was just as good as any man. She didn't have to take a back seat to anything a man could do so, go for what you can get. And she did. And yes, she did prove that she was as good as the next guy. But in Bonnie's mind she's not sure it was worth the price she had to pay. A price that was non refundable on a product that was non returnable.

As Jim and I listened to Bonnie we came to realize that as a fellowship we have somehow neglected the needs of our female colleagues. Her story touched our hearts and gave us a fresh vision and a challenge on meeting some of those needs — a vision that needs to be shared with the readers of 'Peacemaker.'

Bonnie has agreed to tell part of her story in the next issue of the Peacemaker. You won't want to miss it. In the meantime remember, God saw all that he had made, male <u>and female</u> and it was very good.

A SHORT STAY IN THE HOSPITAL

Something unusual happened during my time here this week.

This is not a story about illness so don't worry. It is about a young chaplain who came to visit me right after the doctor had left. With some trepidation I asked did the doctor send you over to see me?

This caused a wry smile to come over his face. He didn't know how to take me. However it soon became apparent to him that I may be a Christian as he spotted a book I had been reading called 'Why I want to change the world.'

After a short talk he learned that my occupation was as a police officer having retired 13 years ago. His interest was in this as he has a son who wants to be a policeman. I gave him some ideas regarding this venture and then he told me his uncle was in the RCMP.

Then he said I was the right person for him to have a couple of his chaplain friends to come over and see if I agreed. "I said that would be fine." The next morning in my two bed room came not two but seven would be chaplains and one senior chaplain. After introductions were made my young host chaplain asked me about my religion. Of course this was in my mind to spell it all out!

I have given my testimony of how I came to Jesus Christ as my Lord and Saviour quite a few times in churches and at functions... but this had to be a first in a place like this... except perhaps to another patient.

I gave my background and how I went into retirement at age 62. I told them how I developed cancer and how my world had stopped — so to speak. It was after much prayer from many people and a quickening of my own conscience through a persistent Inspector of the Metro Toronto Police that gradually, by attending church in the morning and a later visit to his home for tea, the stage was set for the inevitable.

After much conversation about work and the fun times he put a serious question to me. He asked "What are you going to do the rest of your life, when you are well again?" I told him what I would do with retirement and he said "No Jack, I mean your spiritual life." I said I had no plans that way.

With that he took down a Bible from the shelf and pointed out 4 verses speaking to salvation: JOHN 3:16...ROM 3:23...ROM 6:23...and ROM 10:8,9. After going over these I recognized that all of the 50 years before I had not pursued this account for our lives as I did not figure I needed to. I was having too much fun and good health.

A short time after that I realized that I was a sinner and I repented and accepted Jesus as my Saviour. I pledged to serve Him the rest of my life. I joined the F.C.P.O. and since 1987 have served as the Correspondence Secretary answering mail from all over Canada and around the world. I have never been happier in my work! So God Bless you as you read this.

As soon as I finished reading your article I looked at each of the four verses you were directed to. How fitting they are. I recommend everyone read these verses as a reminder

THE ROWE FAMILY ON A MISSION

This summer (1995) our entire family had the privilege to go on missions.

Tera-Lee, my 20 year old daughter, went to Cameroon, Africa for the month of June. This was her fourth consecutive summer on Missions having previously been to Russia, Romania, Hungary, Brazil, Mexico, Paraguay and Mongolia.

The high light of Cameroon was reaching a tribe of pygmies. This tribe is what is called an unreached peoples group and there were 12,000 in the world. Now the gospel has reached one or more and now it is 11,999 to go. Tera-Lee was also able to see 142 people come to know Christ.

Troy, my 17 year old, went to Fort Albany and Moose Factory (Northern Ontario) with 35 other youth from our Youth Group. Here in Canada the youth need the gospel. During their two week trip into Canada's north many young people turned from sniffing glue and gasoline to accepting Christ.

Doreen (my wife) and I were privileged to go to El Salvador to minister to several pastors and leaders. The country of El Salvador, as is all of Central America, is so hungry for the gospel. Many people were saved, healed and delivered. One high light of the trip was praying for a lady in a wheelchair and see her get up and walk. Another high light was leading Martha, a TACA Airline stewardess to Christ at 9:00 a.m., on August 8th. At 6:00 p.m., on August 9th, less than 48 hours later, a TACA Airline plane with 65 people on board crashed into a volcano in San Salvador, the capital city. All 65 people died. I don't know if Martha was on that plane.

As I went through the customs and immigration many officers received the tract "don't be a cop out."

In closing, before you can consider world missions we have to have a vision for our local mission field. Don't let fear stop you from being a bold witness for Christ. Just like Martha, people from our fellow workers need to hear the gospel. Remember we are only responsible for the action and not the results. Jesus said "I will make you fishers of men(women)" and not catchers of men. Be a doer and not a hearer only.

Thanks for allowing me to share what God can do through ordinary people.

TESTIMONY OF MANLEY MCCORKELL

(featured in the Peacemaker in 1986 and reprinted by request)

I was born in a small town in Northern Quebec, Alcove (now called La Peche). My parents were not Christians and only attended church on Christmas and sometimes Easter.

As a youngster I would visit my cousins and go to a Pentecostal Sunday School with them. While attending that Sunday School I memorized the 23rd Psalm which has been my strength for many experiences and in dangerous situations in my life.

When I was a teenager we moved to Ottawa, Ontario, and I hung around with a rough crowd of people, but managed to stay out of trouble. I finished high school and graduated from Fisher Park High. I then went into the electrical trade. In 1965 the electrical trade slowed down and I didn't feel secure anymore so I applied to the Ottawa Police Force.

"This is what I thought I was after." I was looking for glory in my own way and found lots of opportunity to get patted on the back for making a good catch or doing a good job. It really didn't turn out to be a lasting glory that I had expected and wasn't as satisfying as it had looked before I got the praise.

There was one police officer that I remember well and will never forget. He was always joyful and radiant and wasn't looking to take any glory away from anyone else. I couldn't understand this. His name was Doug Seabrooke and he used to tell me about Jesus and the Bible. I listened to him when no one else was around and I asked him questions. When others were around I would make fun of him and put him down. On different occasions he would tell me that God was looking after me and that God wasn't finished with me yet. God had a plan and was looking after me for a reason. I'll never forget all that Doug told me and his patience with me.

In the spring of 1972 I was involved in a ski-doo accident and was in a coma for 2 days. (there were no lasting effects) Later in December of 1972 I was involved in a fatal accident where my partner, Dave Saunders, the driver, was killed. Again I spent several months in hospital and faced six operations. I was left with a steel ankle joint and a few extra parts but I managed to return to police work and stayed until 1976 when I left to farm full time.

Shortly after leaving the police force my wife left me and I had great turmoil in my life. At that point I turned to God and started to pray and read the Bible. All the things that had been told to me by Christians, like Doug, went through my mind and in May of 1976, after talking to several Christians, I got down on my knees, prayed and acknowledged God. I confessed to being a sinner and I asked Jesus Christ into my life as my personal Saviour. For the next five years I did not live in close relation with Jesus but continued to pray and read scripture.

In 1978 I re-married to my wonderful wife Claire. In 1981, after moving to Kelowna B.C., she accepted Christ into her life and I re-dedicated my life back to the Lord. Since then our life together has changed. We have found that in loving Jesus Christ, our love for each other has grown and developed into a union that is unbreakable. I have also learned how to love others with the love that Christ showed me. I thank God for putting the people in my life that brought me to the wonderful loving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CANADIAN F.C.P.O.

Recently I have had numerous requests to place something in the Peacemaker about the history of the C.F.C.P.O. Many of you reading this have lived the beginnings of our Fellowship. Others who have come on stream later have had bits and pieces given to them from time to time. Some of our 'dinosaurs' have rightly cautioned me that we should avoid living in the past. They have had a day in the sun in building the C.F.C.P.O. They point out that we should look to the future and look to bringing the Word to our sisters and brothers so that they too, may enjoy the love of God and the Saving of Christ. As we look to the future it is important that we remember and know from where we speak.

The F.C.P.O. started in 1971 at the Los Angeles Police Academy where several L.A.P.D. officers decided to meet on a weekly basis to have fellowship and Bible study. In September 1972, monthly meetings were started. These meetings included guest speakers, Bible studies, prayer meetings, sharing and the conducting of business matters. There were 65 attending peace officers at this time.

In 1974 the F.C.P.O. was incorporated as a non-profit organization with the objective of bringing others to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ and to promote Christian maturity and growth through study and teach of the Word of God.

In 1978 the F.C.P.O. came to Canada with a chapter in Toronto, Ontario, and a chapter in Vancouver, British Columbia. In April 1983, the Canadian F.C.P.O. was incorporated with the federal government as a non-profit charitable organization. There were chapters in Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia. As of December 1987, the Newfoundland and the Yukon and Northwest Territories joined. There was a total of 31 chapters with approximately 1200 members. Today we have members in every province of Canada!

The main objective of the F.C.P.O. is the worship and glorifying of Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour. The F.C.P.O. is not a charismatic movement, nor is it a denominational group. There are chapters located throughout the country where Peace Officers share the common goals of bringing the word to unsaved brothers and sisters and helping others to mature in their knowledge of Christ.

Starting a chapter takes work, vision and prayer. Maintaining a chapter takes work, vision and prayer. The C.F.C.P.O. has been built on work, vision and prayer. As the Peacemaker went out to members and non-members across the country (and other parts of the world) it became the main outreach tool of the Fellowship in Canada. Chapter Executives, Provincial Representatives, National Directors and National Executives have all worked hard over the years in their devotion to serving God and fellow Peace Officers. The Peace Officer is the purpose and the history of the C.F.C.P.O.

MR. GOD, I'M SORRY

Several years ago I met Joe Haywood. He had a fascinating story to tell so he told it to a journalist named Peter Warren. His tale is a raw and very descriptive narration of growing up in an alcohol crazed home. At sixteen he was "halfway down the road to alcoholism." Later, as an adult, he lived, worked and played totally under the influence of alcohol. Joe Haywood, in his words, was drunk most

Joe's book is deeply emotional. He explains how he blamed his parents, his sergeant in the army, his friends, his ex-wife and yes — even God. After a very tough childhood Joe runs away from home and eventually enters the Canadian Army. He becomes one of Canada's representatives in the United Nations Force in the Congo in 1963. Joe returns home and moves through different Canadian cities and armed forces venues visiting as many bars and bottles as he could. Joe gets married and has three children. He is still drunk all the time.

Joe Haywood loses his temper in a big way and, drunk as usual, "slugged her (his wife) for the first time...and she quit me with the girls. They moved back to Winnipeg." While his wife dated someone else Joe's three children were looked after by a baby sitter. Joe continued to drink very heavily. He got madder and madder. Joe Haywood eventually decides to visit his wife and her male friend. He was a loaded man who took along a loaded rifle. When Joe thought he was shooting his wife and her friend he was actually killing two innocent people; Angie Barker and Lawrence Wasylenko. Angie shared the house that Joe's family lived in. Joe Haywood had finally gone too far.

Joe Haywood was convicted of manslaughter and served time in the Stony Mountain Penitentiary. It was here, in the darkest moments of being alone, that he admitted his guilt and asked forgiveness.

Throughout this book Joe admits his guilt and repeats over and over "Mr. God, I'm sorry." He dedicates his book "To those whose lives I have harmed and to those who still suffer, as I once did." His opening chapter recognizes that God is supreme as he writes "Somewhere down the pike, I'm gonna have to answer to God. I know it. He knows it. It's a meeting that I will have to make, because this is one baby over which I have no control."

When I read this book I really felt that Joe Haywood is sorry for the killing, the mistreatment of others and the sins he committed. I am reminded of the criminal on the cross beside Jesus who rebuked the other for taunting Jesus. This criminal admitted his guilt and punishment and then asked to be remembered when Jesus came to his kingdom. Jesus had mercy on this one who faced death and believed in him. (Luke.23:39-43)

On his release Joe started paying back society for his crimes. He became very involved with alcoholic recovery programs for others and he continues to repeat over and over "Mr. God, I'm sorry." Book reviewed by Tom Huntley, Editor
