When we chose to join our respective professions in law enforcement we made a commitment as members of that profession to serve in our country, province, state or municipality. We took an oath of office and were then given training and written instructions on how to do our job of service to the community. Most of us have lived up to that commitment in one way or another and have been rewarded both financially and, occasionally in merit marks or recommendations for our endeavors. One day we may even get a retirement plaque and some kind words from our employer. But our commitment to law enforcement is only temporary. Whether we quit, retire or buy the farm there comes a time when we all get to turn in our badges. And when we do, we are no longer required to honour the sworn duties we took as peace officers. The word commitment is a little different though in God's kingdom. To start with we didn't choose to service Him. In Paul's letter to the Ephesians we are told that it was God who chose and adopted us (Eph. 1:4,5)

When, as lost sinners we repeat the sinners prayer, we consciously make a deci-

sion to answer God's calling and to serve Him. Unlike our professional careers on earth, we never get to turn in our Christian badges, even when we die. Our commitment is not for as long as we hold a job, or even as long as we are on this earth. It is for eternity.

Once we have made the decision to follow Jesus Christ, it is through prayer and the leading of the Holy Spirit that God gives us a direction to follow. And that is where our Christian commitment begins.

Most of us are led to a local church for fellowship with other believers. In addition to that, God has given us the law enforcement profession for our own ministry to serve Him. There is a unique camaraderie that we share as peace officers. No other profession can boast the fraternal bond that is felt by law enforcement officers.

That esprit de corps has developed only partly because we often feel that those outside our profession simply do not understand what it is that makes us tick. To quote a well known cliché, you've got to 'walk the walk before you can talk the talk'. Well, we *can* talk the talk because we *have* walked the walk - we know all too well what makes us tick. Our founding members were given a clear mandate by God to create the CFCPO in order to spread His word. They recognized that the inherent bonds of our profession created an atmosphere of understanding when sharing the gospel with their colleagues. As a result, the lives of peace officers across our country have been changed through a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

Based on the principle that we are to "disseminate, teach and preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and thus fulfill the supreme commission..."¹, the CFCPO is committed to spreading the good news of Jesus Christ. But this cannot be achieved without the service and commitment of our members. In order to achieve God's purpose, the CFCPO needs your support. How can I support? It's really very simple.

Sacrificing Yourself

In the last issue I wrote about not having to prove yourself as a peace officer just because you are a woman. There are also ways to avoid sacrificing yourself, or worse, losing yourself, professionally and ultimately, personally.

When policing becomes the centre of your identity, this can easily happen. As in any profession, when we allow our work to define who we are, we begin to lose perspective when it comes to self-worth.

An American writer and pediatrician by the name of Sally Shaywitz says, "To be somebody a woman does not have to be more like a man, but has to be more of a woman." I think there is a lot of wisdom in that statement. Unfortunately, we as women don't necessarily buy into that. In the 1970's when women's liberation was making a big impact in our society, women everywhere as well as the men they worked for, determined that to succeed women had to purchase pinstripe "power suits" and do business like men.

But in September of 1995, Fortune magazine surveyed women executives in mid life. They were surprised to find that many career women have become weary of the male dominated game and now seek to do business more on their own terms. Peace keeping professions are no exception.

So, how does a female peace officer become more of a woman? How does she protect and define her self worth?

Knowing your limitations is one way. As a Christian, a basic belief in God and His son Jesus, helps me to understand who I am as a woman, no matter what profession I am in. The Bible clearly defines God's intent when He created the feminine counterpart to man, called woman. Along with that comes certain limitations, just as men have limitations.

Physical limitations are an obvious case in point. I am surprised at female officers

who insist that they enjoy a good fight as much as their male counterparts. I know there are times a female member can be ineffective in a scuffle purely because of size and build. Conversely, I also know that male members can be ineffective in domestic or dealing with rape victims, solely because of their gender. There is nothing wrong with men and women complementing each other. Somewhere along the line we have missed that.

When I was serving in the RCMP I was determined never to cry in front of my male peers. That hurt only me. I spent so many years stuffing my emotions deep down, I paid a big price for it later in life.

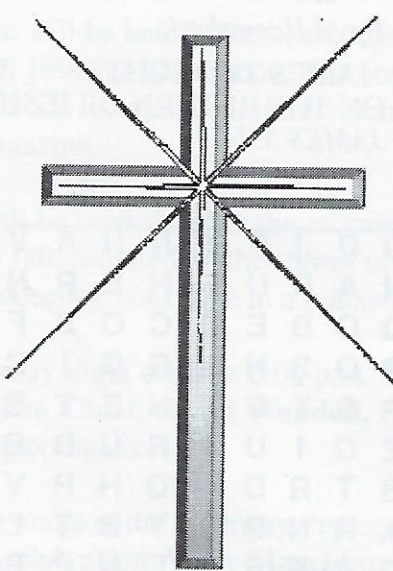
To Become more of a woman, allow your feminine nature and characteristics to be expressed. When I was serving in the RCMP I was determined never to cry in front of my male peers. That hurt only me. I spent so many years stuffing my emotions deep down, I paid a big price for it later in life

When you take off that uniform, but especially while you're in it, be comfortable with your

identity as a woman. Adopting masculine characteristics does not make you a better police officer or a stronger woman. It simply makes you a woman trying to be like a man. Ironically, men don't respect that attitude or posture in a woman. Ask one and see what his response is!

You don't have to sacrifice who you are as a woman to be a peace officer. Remember, God didn't rest until *after* He created woman (Gen. 1:27-31). It was only then that God "saw all that He made and it was very good". Until woman was created something was missing. View yourself as part of the completion to God's creation, rather than an afterthought. It makes all the difference to how you view your femininity.

Come and enjoy the inspirational message from Inspector **Ivan Brown** of the Jamaican Constabulary Force.

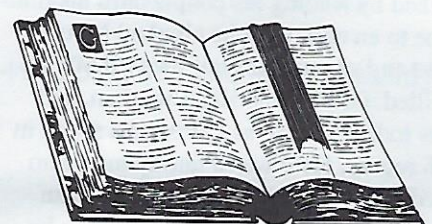

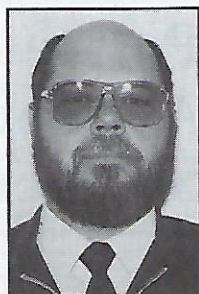

Editorial "Practice What You Preach"

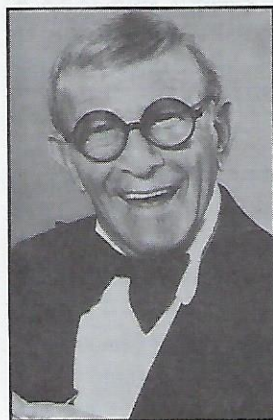

This Easter we once again rejoice in His coming and resurrection. I urge you to remember that Jesus has challenged all of us to bring His word to God's people.

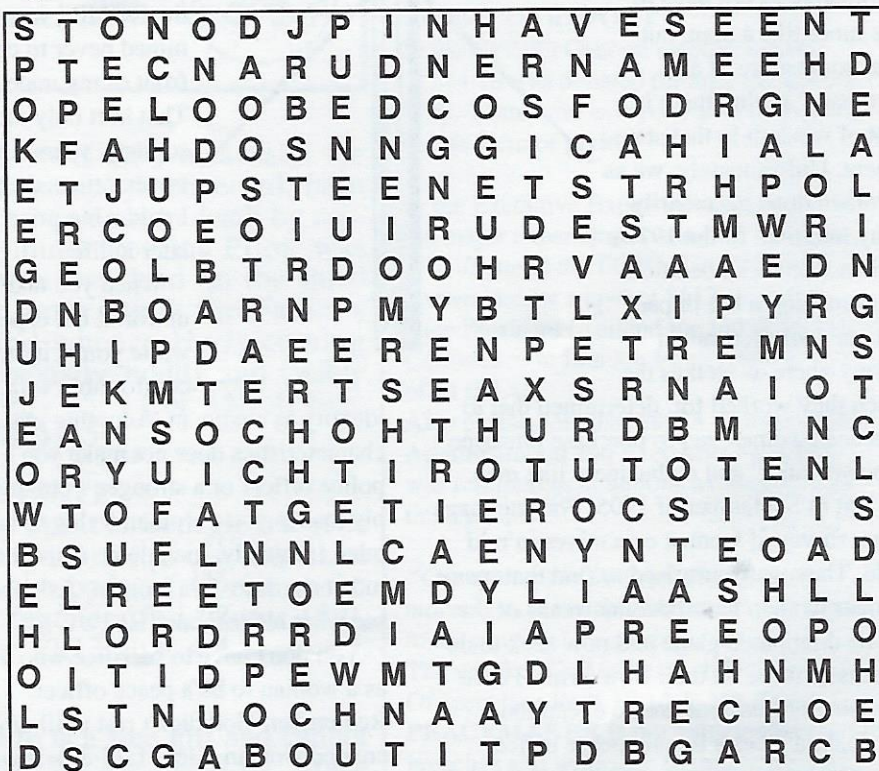

Reflections of the First International Conference of Christian Police Fellowships

My wife Ruth and I had the excitement and privilege of attending the First International Conference of Christian Police Fellowships at the Salvation Army Conference Centre, Sunbury Court, United Kingdom, from Friday October 13th to Sunday October 15th 1995. Along with **Hank Harley**, Chief of police, Tillsonburg, Ontario, we were the three Canadians in attendance. (see Hank's report in the Winter Issue of the PEACEMAKER)

As I reflect on this three day conference I have to conclude right away that it was absolutely the finest conference (of any sort) that we have ever attended. My reflections might be summarized with three expressions:

- i) Simply Fantastic
- ii) Sweet Fellowship
- iii) Spirit Filled

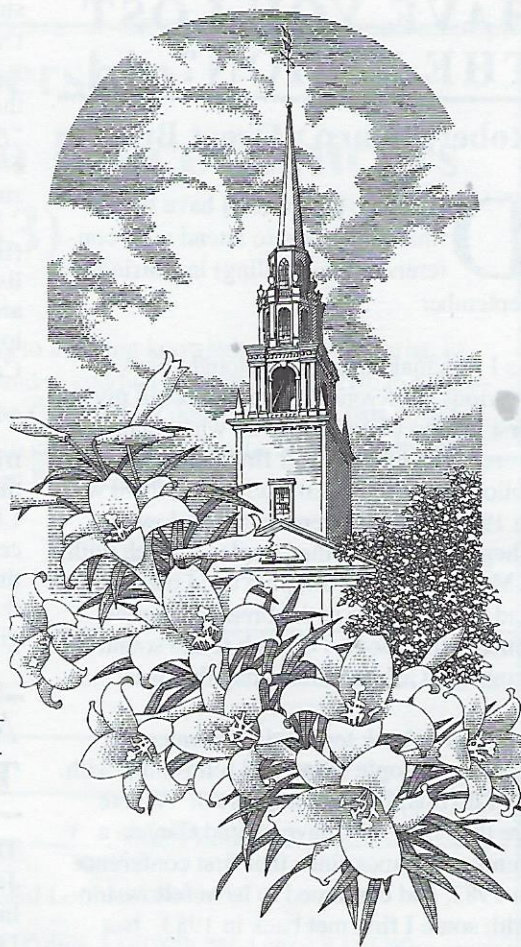
First, the accommodations were *simply fantastic*, with excellent rooms, comfortable beds, superb food and delightful people. Second, we all experienced *sweet fel-*

lowship while there. With serving and retired police officers and prison officials from all over the world (18 countries!) we discussed many topics of mutual interest and concern.

Having spent 35 years as a police officer, and over 40 years as a Christian, I have attended many conferences, seminars and meetings. When the objective was Christian in nature, there were many times that my views from the perspective of a police officer were not fully understood, or even accepted. Then again, at many police oriented meetings, my views and standards relating to my Christian faith, with it's subsequent responsibilities, were also not understood much of the time.


At the FCPF Conference, our particular views and persuasions (on both sides) were not only in unison, but completely compatible. The difficulties and frustrations experienced as Christian Peace Officers were almost identical in all parts of the world, and similar approaches to these problems were obstructed by evil forces everywhere. Satan does not overlook any parts of this world, but, PRAISE THE LORD, He, our Lord, is everywhere as well.

Lastly, the atmosphere surrounding the conference, from start to finish, was *Spirit Filled*. **Robin Oake and Bob Vernon** inspired us with their presentations which were full of their insight and personal knowledge of Scripture and with their particular approach and Christian application to a variety of everyday police occurrences. As a retired police officer, I could not help



but have wished that I might have heard such a presentation when I was younger and actively involved in police work. They would have benefited myself as a Christian and might have offered a stronger Christian approach to my duties as a police officer.

At the conclusion of the conference, when it was time to bid farewell to the many brothers and sisters we met, many tears were in evidence. The intimate bond of Christian (and police) fellowship, and the spiritual enrichment we shared, terminated with a most memorable communion service with **Esther Vernon** (Bob's wife) singing beautifully *Until We Meet Again*. Emotions were running high and it was our individual wish (as unrealistic as it might appear) that the conference might go on indefinitely. It was indeed a touch of heaven!!

HAVE YOU LOST THE VISION?

During the past week I have been finalizing plans to attend your conference (God willing) in Barrie in September.

As I was making plans, I thought back to previous conferences. I remembered my first visit to Canada in 1982 when plans were made to hold your first conference the following year. What excitement there was in 1983 when we were marched down Sheppard Ave., to the Peoples Church with a Motor Cycle escort, pipe band playing and flags waving in the breeze. Then we entered the Peoples Church to the sound of Amazing Grace. What a day that was!

As I think back to that day, I remember names of people who I had fellowship with. As I do this, I am asking myself "Where are they now?". I have visited Canada a number of times since that first conference in 1983, and continued to have fellowship with some I first met back in 1983. But what about the other's I met, where are they now?.

Some have retired from law enforcement, some may have been promoted to glory, but others seem to have lost the vision and have fallen by the wayside. These people as still in law enforcement, but sadly, are not active in the CFCPO.

If you were to ask them why they were no longer active, they would give you a good excuse. I can think of a number of the excuses that may be given, but that's all they are. The vision and need to reach colleagues with the Gospel is still as great in 1996 as it was in 1983. Men and women in law enforcement are still dying in their sins without Christ.

In 1996, will you lay aside your excuses why you are no longer involved with the CFCPO, and try to catch the vision you once had? Get down on your knees, and rededicate yourself before God to helping the CFCPO to reach unsaved colleagues with the Gospel. For some of you this might be a hard thing to do. You might have been hurt in the past by someone or something that has happened in the fellowship. Forgiving is easy, forgetting is harder, but not impossible if we rely on His

strength and not our own.

Once before these words were in the Peacemaker, they are appropriate now as they were then:
"Arise of men of God, have done with lesser things; give heart and soul and mind and strength, to serve the King of Kings."

(By) September, will you have re-established your fellowship with the CFCPO and arranged to be at the conference and fellowship with believers from all over Canada and beyond?

• Peace Officers and their spouses, children and parents are all invited to contribute.

• Provide true stories that readers can apply to their own lives - inspire, don't preach.

• Be open, honest and vulnerable. Show readers the power of Jesus in your life.

• Make certain your title, opening Scripture, story and closing prayer all tie in together.

• Write so that non-Christians will be drawn to Jesus Christ and believers will be strengthened.

• Avoid Christian jargon and pat answers

• You may use but are not limited to the following themes:

To Serve and Protect
Hot Pursuit
Self Defense
Internal Affairs
War stories
Living the Blues
Beyond a Reasonable Doubt
Answering the call

• Double space the manuscript and note whether you are offering one time or reprint rights (please include when and where the item was previously published), include a SASE as well as a short biography (75-100 words).

Payment: I hope to be able to negotiate payment in the form of one free book and the opportunity to purchase additional copies at 50% exchange for one time rights. All other rights belong to the contributor. Contributors are free to offer manuscript elsewhere as long as it is not offered with all or first rights. Once a contract is signed by me and I have accepted your manuscript, it can appear elsewhere as long as a credit line acknowledging Answering the Call is included. 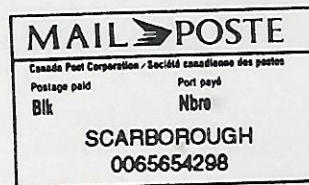
