big salvation He has to give you, But He is
ten thousand times more pleased when you
set to work to help other people.

I discovered this article recently in a mis-
sions publication. I was taken with the pas-
sion and immediacy of the content of
General Booth's words. The call to action
for Christian Peace Officers can be heard in
this declaration. It is time we spoke about
the hard facts rather than the palatable mes-
sages so often heard from liberal clergy.
God has an expectation of us who have the
privilege of knowing scripture and have
seen God's power evident in their lives. He
supplies each one of us what we need in tal-
ents, skills, energy to be His workmanship,
created in Christ Jesus for good works,"
(Ephes. 2:10) I

1 Corinthians 3: 5 to 16 speaks to us
about the expectation God has for us, to
work, stimulating growth and prosperity.
Actions words such as planting, watering
with God granting any increase is used to
promote the idea of growth in the body of
Christ. Verse 9 indicates that we are "God's
fellow workers, you are God's field, you are
God's building" all elements which show
the prosperity of work carried out upon the
foundation of Jesus Christ.

The passage is concluded by Paul provid-
ing us with a warning. Our expected work
or neglected work will be judged, in the
"judgement of rewards" that all Christians
will be subjected to. Paul uses 6 materials
to rank our work, Gold, silver, precious
stones, wood, hay and straw. Our work will
be tested by the fires of judgement to see if
it withstands and endures. Those whose
work withstands the fires of judgement, like
gold, silver or precious stones will be given
a reward, but those whose work, effort,
refusal or neglect is consumed like wood,
hay or straw will suffer the loss of rewards.
That does not mean you will lose your sal-
vation but that you will have a reduction in
final reward.

That admonition brings me to my point.
We as a fellowship are praying for strength-
ening of Chapters in Barrie, Edmonton,

Calgary, Toronto, Surrey, Ottawa, Regina,
Winnipeg and the "Bluenose" Chapter in
Nova Scotia. For word on activity from the
chapters in London, Niagara Region,
Quebec Region and Lethbridge. We pray
for those fledgling works in Victoria and
Vancouver, while praying for chapter inter-
est in Newfoundland, New Brunswick,
P.E.I., Montreal and elsewhere in Quebec,
for Kingston and south-western Ontario,
Peel and the Guelph-Cambridge-Waterloo
triangle area, the prairies and northern B.C.
We pray without ceasing for new young
members of the F.C.P.O. (Canada) National
Board. All of these are significant prayer
concerns of this ministry, and not one con-
cern that has been described cannot be ful-
filled by someone being obedient in answer-
ing the call of the Lord on their lives.

God always wraps His will in a person,
we are praying in God's will that this min-
istry will flourish to the Glory of God. If
our prayer is for strengthening of chapters,
that prayer can be answered when officers
in the area become active in their support
for the chapter. If our prayer is for word on
chapter activity or for fledgling works, that
prayer can be answered by volunteers to
supply leadership and influence and sup-
port. When our prayer is for areas of
Canada which are not well represented by
chapters, such a prayer can be answered by
people meeting to organize a chapter,
maybe just two, remembering that, "God
grants the increase." (continued on pg 4)

The Editor's Desk

Over the past year and a half I found myself in great turmoil. I was on the go more than I had ever been. At church, at work, as a volunteer and whatever else I seemed to be into I was in a constant state of movement and rushing.



Two things happened over the 1998 Christmas season that became very important life messages for me. The first event was actually two occurrences separated by a few weeks. My home computer crashed - twice. The first time delayed the mailing of the PEACEMAKER to Canada. The second delayed the mailing to USA, Europe, Africa and Australia. (In fact, at the time of this writing, I still don't have my labels printer on line for world wide mailing. Some file seems to be lost and, since it is an old printer, I am having trouble locating a suitable driver) The second crash was severe. I had to reformat my hard drive and when I tried to reload windows - BOOM! - nothing worked. The repair needed a professional and that wasn't going to happen until January sometime.

For the second event I came down with a bad flu that was making its rounds here. I was literally knocked out of commission. I hurt everywhere and my asthma kicked in. I was weak and very sickly. The coughing got so bad that I pulled some muscles in my chest wall and back. That only made the coughing more painful.

As already mentioned, I had been on the go for some time and one of the worst time consumers I was attached to was the internet. I would find myself on the net at 1:30 a.m. when I had to get up for a full day and evening of work starting at 5:30 a.m.

So, what did these two things do to me? They took me out of the rat race! The computer crash got me off it and the internet. It also stopped me doing additional work at home while I was supposed to be on vacation. The flu (which turned into bronchitis) made sure I didn't go and do work somewhere else.

What to do with my time? God provided exceedingly well. I read and read and read. First I studied several books of the Bible. I have the NIV study Bible so there is a lot more than just reading chapter and verse. I got caught up with my readings of *Our*

Daily Bread (RBC Ministries publication, often featured here in PEACEMAKER). I delved into two new readings. One is a daily devotional called *Streams in the Desert* (Zondervan Publishing). The original was written by L.B. Cowmann in 1925 and was updated by James Reimann.

For Christmas Anne gave me an inspirational self-help book, *The Man in the Mirror*, by Patrick Morley (Zondervan Publishing). This book is great. By paragraph 3 of the first chapter I said "that's me! I'm in the rat race and it is time to get out."

The result of this was over three weeks of computer crash and illness. When my vacation was over I tried a couple of days at work and ended up taking another week sick leave (for those who know me well this was a major personal break-through).

I was able to refocus. I have so many commitments on my time that I often scramble two and three things at once. Those that end in 1999 will not be renewed.

I will continue to move top speed at work (*Serve wholeheartedly, as if you were serving the Lord* Eph. 6:7) but I will stop trying to put twenty-five hours in an eight hour work day.

Are you in the rat race? Are you pushing yourself for material gain or personal recognition? Or are you one who just can't say no sometimes? If you are I urge you to re-think things and start removing some of the go for a lot more slow. Sit back, relax and read your Bible. As you read, ponder it, study it and absorb its wonderful beauty as God's personal message to you sinks in.

Find some inspirational books and articles to fill some of your new time. Let the experience of others influence you for a time, instead of you having to influence all those around you.

Finally, like Jesus told us, go to your darkened room and talk to God. He sent me a couple of reminders that I had been missing one on one contact with Him. He made me realize that I was suffering needlessly for a race no person can win.

PENDER ISLAND POSTING

In July of 1995, I was posted to an island (Pender Island) situated between Victoria and Vancouver. Our detachment is comprised of a Cpl/Cst on Pender, a Cst on Mayne and a Cst on Galiano and is responsible for about 20 islands of varying sizes and population base.

In coming here, we didn't attend a church regularly and we had occasion to start corresponding with Jack Turner. After a number of letters back and forth, it was suggested that perhaps an FCPO chapter could be formed in the Victoria area. (A 45-minute ferry and a half-hour drive!) I must admit that I did think Jack had no idea about what he was suggesting and it was probably a good thing, as then, he may not have done so.

My time on Pender Island has been a real blessing to both my wife and I. We were able to get out of the hustle and bustle of separate lives in Vancouver and begin to grow together. We were also blessed with our daughter in 1997 and are expecting our second in about 6 weeks. I, like so many members, took my time of monthly fellowship for granted. Coming here, there were 2 RCMP members and little chance to gather in a group setting with other Christian Officers. It did, however, serve to instill more of a discipline in daily devotions and strengthen my marriage. I have to say that the greatest impact in my walk has been becoming a father. It was at the moment that I held a tiny child in my arms and knew that there was nothing I would not do for her, that I truly understood just how much we are loved by our Father. It served to teach me just how much he hurts when we sin and brought home meaning to "for God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son..."

This past summer saw some real opportunities for the FCPO in Victoria and in September, a small BBQ was held at a Saanich Officers house. In December, we had our first meeting of the Southern Vancouver Island FCPO Chapter and are continuing to grow and establish contacts up and down the island with other Christian members. One of the biggest hurdles is getting the news out there that the FCPO even exists. Many Christian officers aren't aware and are so excited once they hear of the local chapter.

I was encouraged at the annual conference when Jim Sneepe admonished us with the fact that numbers aren't what count. Whenever, two or more gather, then the Lord is present and the important thing is

that you provide the time and place to gather. The matter is simple: if a Mountie who doesn't even live on Vancouver Island can help start a chapter, then an officer who simply has to get in his car and drive certainly can. Listen and you will be blessed.

At the time of writing, I have been notified of a transfer to Colwood Detachment (just outside Victoria). How ironic in that Jack must have known something so long ago. Despite all my correspondence over the years with Jack, my regret is that he was too ill to make it to the annual conference in Calgary where we had hoped to meet. I would have to say that his lack of any idea into demographics and his vision for the FCPO were a blessing in our Chapter starting. Our hope as Christians is that we will all meet again and to that I am thankful that I will see Jack.

A TOUCHING STORY

On a cold day in 1942, inside a Nazi concentration camp, a lone young boy looks beyond the barbed wire and sees a young girl pass by. She too, is moved by his presence. In an effort to give expression to her feelings, she throws a red apple over the fence - a sign of life, hope, and love. The young boy bends over, picks up the apple. A ray of light has pierced his darkness.

The following day, thinking he is crazy for even entertaining the notion of seeing this young girl again, he looks out beyond the fence, hoping. On the other side of the barbed wire, the young girl yearns to see again this tragic figure who moved her so. She comes prepared with apple in hand. Despite another day of wintry blizzards and chilling air, two hearts are warmed once again as the apple passes over the barbed wire. The scene is repeated for several days. The two young spirits on opposite sides of the fence look forward to seeing each other, if only for a moment and if only to exchange a few words.

The interaction is always accompanied

by an exchange of inexplicably heartening feelings. At the last of these momentary meetings, the young boy greets his sweet friend with a frown and says, "Tomorrow, don't bring me an apple, I will not be here. They are sending me to another camp." The young boy walks away, too heartbroken to look back.

From that day forward, the calming image of the sweet girl would appear to him in moments of anguish. Her eyes, her words, her thoughtfulness, her red apple, all were a recurring vision that would break his nighttime sweats. His family died in the war. The life he had known had all but vanished, but this one memory remained alive and gave him hope.

In 1957 in the United States, two adults, both immigrants, are set up on a blind date. "And where were you during the war?" Inquires the woman. "I was in a concentration camp in Germany," the man replies. "I remember I used to throw apples over the fence to a boy who was in a concentration camp," she recalls.

With a feeling of shock, the man speaks. "And did that boy say to you one day, 'Don't bring an apple anymore because I am being sent to another camp'?" "Why, yes," she responds, "but how could you possibly know that?" "He looks into her eyes and says, 'I was that young boy.' There is a brief silence, and then he continues, 'I was separated from you then, and I don't ever want to be without you again. Will you marry me?' They embrace one another as she says, "Yes."

On Valentine's Day 1996, on national telecast of the Oprah Winfrey show, this same man affirmed his enduring love to his wife of forty years. "You fed me in the concentration camp," he said, "you fed me throughout all these years; now, I remain hungry if only for your love."

Comment: The darkest moments of one's life may carry the seeds of the brightest tomorrow.

Editor's note: The crucifixion of Jesus must have meant the end of a wonderful dream for many early followers. What joy there must have been in the realization of His resurrection. That joy will be seen again when He returns to bring peace to the world. Just like the couple in this story, we will rejoice at our reunion. Happy and Blessed Easter to all! T.H.

"Find your own Calcutta." That was the response Mother Teresa sent to a woman who wanted to join her in ministering to one of India's most crowded cities.

Whatever the motives, the terse advice she received is a discerning word we all should heed. It captures the essence of Paul's message to the church at Corinth: "*Serve the lord in whatever situation he has placed you.*" (1Cor. 7:17-24).

I recall the illusion-punching challenge John Alexander, one time president of InterVarsity, gave to a group of students: "What have you done this past year to make a helpful difference within a mile of your home?" The hungry, the suffering, the unevangelized at our doorstep lack the more appealing aura of the needy souls elsewhere on the planet. But the ones closest to us are those whose needs we are best equipped to meet.

Let's take personally what Jesus said to a man he had set free from demons: "*Go home to your friends, and tell them what great things the Lord has done for you.*" (Mk. 5:19)

If we look around us through the eyes of Jesus, we're sure to find a Calcutta close by.

Thank you Jack. We will keep the FCPO alive in Canada and your presence will continue throughout the world where we interact with the saved and unsaved peace officers.

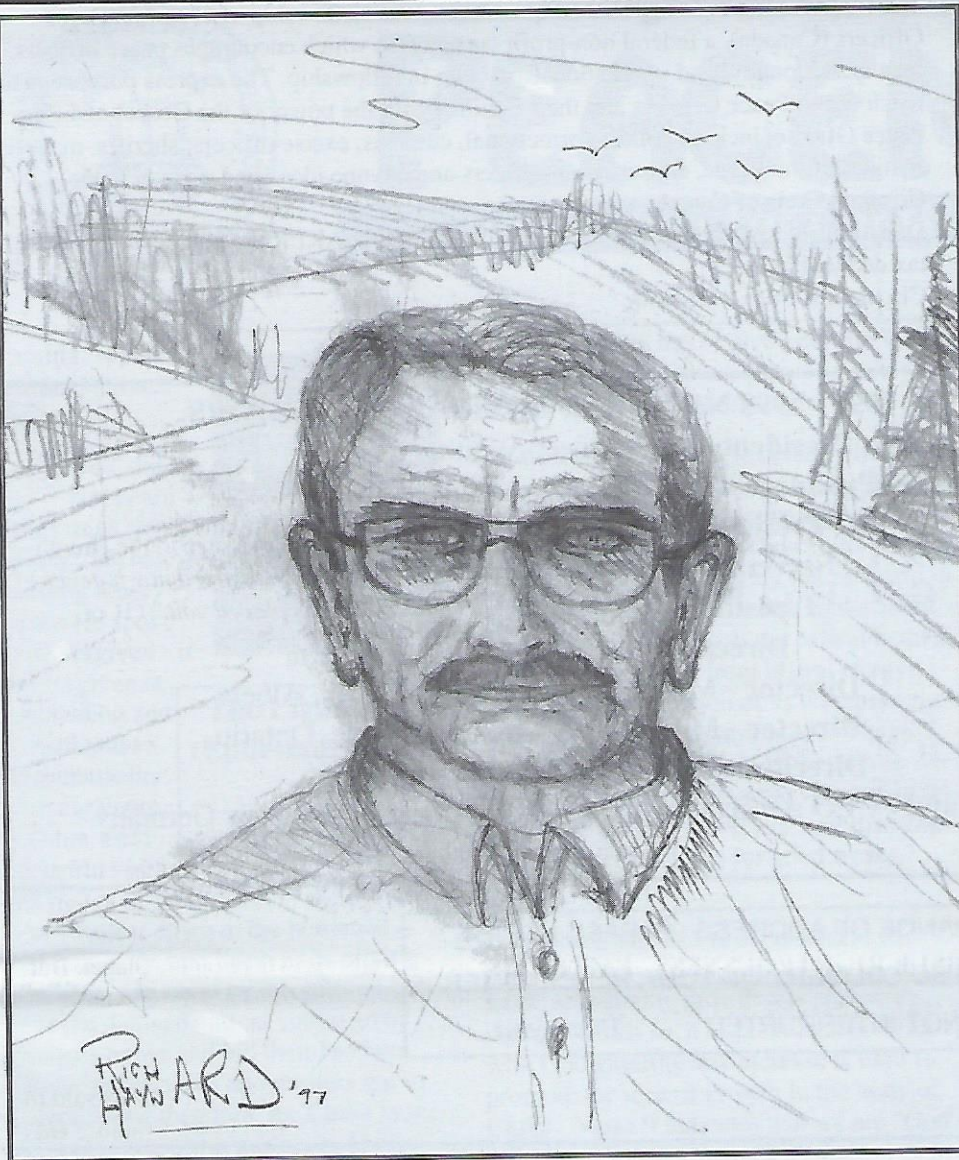
The National Brochure

My first view of Jack was at a Pizza Meeting of the F.C.P.O in the O.P.P. HQ cafeteria on Harbour St. in downtown Toronto about 19 years ago. He was skinny as a rail. His voice was raspy. He had just retired from Metro Toronto PF.

His testimony was vibrant, combining laughs and tears with the Power of Christ having entered his life.

We traveled together sometimes for the FCPO and one such trip was in B.C. There were 5 guys in a Mercury Pacer with our knees up our noses.

Memories of Jack flood my memory. I smile through the tears. Here was a man who loved life and fought for it. He loved his wife, his "Dutch Tulip", Laura, and so do I and my wife Joan. He loved people and he loved the F.C.P.O. and he loved police officers.

By far he loved his Lord and Saviour (and mine), Jesus Christ.
