What has been happening? A number of things have kept me busy like the Conference 2008 - One Spirit, One Mind, which by all reports to date, was very successful. In addition, I have been taking a Master's Degree in Minisitry (for which I have had to write a total of 12 papers and do 3 research projects over the last 6 months), I teach adult life classes at my church and so on. Getting To Know

You

In this issue, I would like to introduce to Don McLaughlin. Don is a retired Toronto Police Service officer. Since his retirement in 2000, he has found himself leading misison trips and has taken the leadership of the international radio bible ministry.



Tell our readers a little bit about your child-hood Don.

I was born and raised in the Ottawa Valley town of Renfrew in a

dedicated Catholic family. As a young person I developed and intense desire to know God and did all I could to find him-even joining the altar boys and serving at every opportunity. Unfortunately those were frustrating years as everything seemed to be one way for me-I never got a response.

As a young man did you have a desire to be a peace officer?

Policing never entered my mind but I was drawn toward the uniform, and joined the Air Cadets. I enjoyed the friendship and disciplined environment and became comfortable with all that went with it.

What age were you when you decided policing was for you and what helped you make that decision?

At 20 years of age after finishing high school, I heard about the Police Cadet Program in Toronto so I applied. As I went further into the program I fell totally in love with it and for years could not get enough. I enjoyed the work, my fellow officers and of course the uniform identity.

Don, you spent 29 years with the Toronto Police Service, what were some of the duties you had with them?

My first 14 years were spent on the street some of which was training for various investigative and other non-uniform work. I never really hit my stride until I became involved in public safety education. I was priviledged to be one of 29 officers chosen to educate children on various aspects of saftey including drugs and eventually became part of the VIP program for Grade 6 students. I trained other officers, teachers, probation officers and gaurds in the program. I really sensed this is where the Lord wanted me.

What was it that drew you toward the Lord in 1973?

I gave up trying to find God by age 12. In primary school I had an "A" average but by the time I reached high school and age 14 I was drinking alcohol and by the time I left school it was every weekend. I failed one year, got suspened another year and actually barely made it through school. By the time I reached the police cadet program I had alot of baggage yet, the intense desire to know God continued. One day while driving with my wife, I heard a religious radio program and felt an overwhelming sense of destiny.

I felt drawn toward a fellow officer I thought of as a "religious nut" and began asking him questions about the bible and much more buthHis answers were brief. So I invited myself to his Church and there heard the message of salvation and never made it out of my seat before I begged Jesus to save me. After the service I confirmed it in prayer with the Pastor. It was an amazing moment of revelation for me.

Who was the most instrumental person in your decision?

There is not doubt it was that Christian officer although he was somewhat reluctant due to the negative reputation I had after only one year. I don't blame him, I didn't like me much at that time either.

At what point in your career did you know the Lord had a definite calling for your life after retirement?

After 6 years as a Christian, I began to feel called to serve God at my local Church and did so as I continued policing. Around that time I had been asked by a supervisor to do something that meant I would compromise my biblical convictions. I refused so he encouraged me to leave as I obviously wasn't officer material. This and other circumstances shook my faith in the policing system.

Around that time I was facing the possibility of involvement in a radio ministry that was about to build a Christian radio station in the Middle East. I changed my direction and got involved in the radio ministry in 1979 and continued in various ways and retired from the Toronto Police Service in 2000 when I went full time with the ministry. I have served with High Adventure Ministries Canada in various positions since retirement.

We have built Christian radio stations in South Lebanon and broadcast to both the PLO terrorist in the north and Israel in the south. Since our leader in the area retired and Israel withdrew from the area we have also had to leave. We have various stations that broadcast into Central America, Cuba, China and Southeast Asia. At the moment we air programming in 32 languages, on 31 frequencies over shortwave radio. We also broadcast on 40 partner stations so the message is reaching a broad spectrum of folks around the world.

Do you think that FCPO impacted your life as an officer and a person?

Absolutely. I developed relationships with officers with similar problems. It was a place where we could be real and it was an opportunity for us to serve Him in Church gatherings and so on. Peer pressure is a strong thing to face for young Christian officers, they-we need each other.

Don, we have a couple of young officers in the TPS that have taken up the FCPO torch. What would you say to them as a word of encouragement?

I would ask them to stay real. There are other Don's out there just like me. Though they may have a nasty-rough

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exterior like I did, inside they are looking for answers just as I was.

For now as FCPO leadership, you have a unique opportunity-probably more than anyone else in Canada. You have an OPEN door into Churches to preach, share, sing-whatever....and your integrous position will add weight to your words.

It only takes commitment to walk through those doors where you will find many waiting to hear what the Lord gives you to say. FCPO is a strategic ministry opportunity to reach peace officers and others in Canada. Last, remember policing is a time of preparing you for the work the Lord will have for you when you retire. Be sensitive to the leading of the Holy Spirit and see what He can and will do with your lives.

Don, I didn't get to print everything we visited about but I do want to thank you for being willing to share yourself with us. May God continue to bless that which you set your hand to.






Our first speaker was Rev. Don Schiemann who spoke on Finding God's Grace in times of struggle.

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Don lost his son Peter in a line of duty death incident at Mayerthorpe, Alberta and he told us of the effect it



has had on him and his wife. He began by saying it was never his intention to be here, meaning if the awful circumstances of his sons life had never occured he wouldn't be speaking to us. That statement moved me as I realized it isn't always the best circumstances that bring us to the forefront. Don shared how the Lord had provided grace in their time of struggle.

He also spoke of the injustices within the criminal justice system and the work he is doing to try and be an advocate for change. It was a very moving and powerful time for all in attendance.

After Don spoke we broke for lunch and fellowship and then the set of festivities



began by loading the delegates into a fifteen passenger van, a Jeep Commander and a 4 door GMC Sierra truck and off we went to the RCMP Training Depot.

While at Depot we were able to take in the Sgt. Major's Parade. It wasn't long until we could see the recruits begin to gather and form into parade groups. Soon we could hear the Sgt. Major providing commands and they began to pass by the front of us on their way to the parade square.



It was quite a show as the recruits marched back and forth in various formations while a band contingency played. After about 30 minutes of marching they exited the parade square and headed back to barracks and classes. It was worth the visit.

From the parade square we made our way over to the new RCMP Heritage Centre and began a tour. Once inside we were treated to a short video presentation and then viewed the exhibits.



In the evening delegates gathered outside the hotel and were taken by vehicle over to New Beginnings Lutheran Church for our worship service. The service was led by



Steve Raine (an RCMP member) and his group "Arise." This service was absolutely one of the major highlights of the conference. When we first arrived and started it seemed as though many were satisfied just being spectators. Yet as Steve and his group continued in such a sweet spirit, you could sense a distinct change from spectatorship to that of coming before the Lord to worship Him.

Reports on activity provided by Ron Seeney, Todd Snooks, Merv Tippe and Andrew Cowan. FCPO continues to have steady growth in numbers and as a ministry.

A financial report was provided by Andrew Cowan, who advised we are holding our own but our finances nowhere closely reflect the size of organization we are. We often have to hold back involvement in ministry because financially we are unable to do so.

This raised the issue again of a membership fee. After a number of years of discussing this, the Board decided it was time we move to an annual membership fee in order to see FCPO-Canada continue to grow and continue to be effective. The matter of an amount was discussed and a yearly fee of \$20.00 per person was arrived at. At Work

I know that some of you may question the idea of a membership fee but I wanted to show you one way funds are being used to God's glory. FCPO-Canada for the last three years has used some of the funds received for purchase of the Bibles and Bible Study Guides you see on the next page.

First this is a method of outreach to peace officers in general, and second, we use them as a way of providing new recruits graduating police colleges across Canada, a spiritual tool kit to assist them and their families to adjust to the policing lifestyle and let them know how God fits into it all. We have had many good reports from those who have recieved these materials and we believe it is one part of our ministry that has great impact.

We are doing much work with new recruits at the RCMP Academy in Regina. These men and women who come from all points across Canada some leaving behind wives and children can find it a real adjustment. We do our best to be their family or at least provide a sense of family connection for them while here.

On a rotating basis of about every three weeks a bible study takes place for those who wish to attend. When I know ahead of time that a Christian recruit is coming to Regina, I will get in touch with them before arrival and provide them with my name and contact numbers. I follow up as soon as they are here and meet with them after they settle in.

I meet with them one on one and on occasion in small groups. One of the larger events we held in the last two months was a pizza and fellowship night paid for by FCPO Saskatchewan. We had 12 recruits come and along with members of the local FCPO Chapter we had a great time of food, fun and fellowship. Below is a photo of a graduating Troop from the RCMP Academy in which we handed out 10 sets of Bibles and Study Guides. Eight of the recruits posed for a photo as a group. This is such a worthwhile part of our


ministry and although we are not at every single graduation ceremony we often provide Bibles and Study Guides to some members the graduating troops.
