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Policing and the Reformation

On October 31, 2017, Protestant Christians around the world will be celebrating 500 years since the start of the Protestant Reformation. On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the church door at Wittenberg. This act was the beginning of many attempts to "reform" the church – a call to return to scripture and scripture alone.

But is the Reformation still relevant for us today? I grew up in the Christian Reformed Church; a denomination that by its very name values the principles of the Reformation. But what I learned from post-reformation scholars is that Reformation is not a static thing. Dutch Politician and Scholar, Abraham Kuyper proposed the concept of sphere sovereignty. This concept asserts that each sphere (or sector) of life has its own distinct responsibilities and authority or competence, and stands equal to other spheres of life. What this means in terms of the Reformation, is that reforming, in the life of a Christian, goes beyond the church and into every aspect of life.

God is sovereign over every part of our world: church, family, social life, work, etc. So what does this mean? It means that God doesn't want us to be "Sunday Christians" God calls us to examine every aspect of our lives and devote it to him. This means that we are also called to "reform" fallen structures in

our lives. Reformation is an ongoing re-examination of our roles in life as parents, friends, church members and workers and to find ways of devoting each aspect of our lives to God's glory.

Many of us understand the term "vocation" instead of a career. Our vocation is our calling in life – every "calling" in life forms our vocation. How we work, how we parent, how we volunteer, how we relate to our peers. We are called to serve God in each of these roles we take up.



So what does this mean for policing? How do we "police" as Christians? On October 1st we saw the news coverage of the massacre in Las Vegas. As police officers, we are witness to evil on a daily basis. Abuse, assaults, murder, threats. The list goes on and on. We also witness the results

and carnage of this evil. This past week, I responded to a double fatality of two young people involve in a police pursuit. The carnage I saw will likely be etched in my mind forever. Many of you know exactly what I'm talking about.

We also face political issues and negative media whether it is from groups like Black Lives Matter, or proponents against "carding". We get labelled as "racists" and "thugs". We second-guess our decisions because of the looming threat of complaints and perhaps a lack of support from "the brass".

So how do we fulfill our roles as Christians amid the adversity we face? Policing isn't getting any easier. But we need to remember that as a Christian, God hasn't just called us to a "career" in policing, but to make it part of our vocation. Many of us like to refer to Romans 13 almost as a "battle cry" for police officers:

ILet everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God. 2Consequently, whoever rebels against the authority is rebelling against what God has instituted, and those who do so will bring judgment on themselves. 3For rulers hold no terror for those who do right, but for those who do wrong. Do you want to be free from fear of the one in authority? Then do what is right and you will be commended. 4For the one in authority is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for rulers do not bear the sword for no reason. They are God's servants, agents of wrath to bring punishment on the wrongdoer.5Therefore, it is necessary to submit to the authorities, not only because of possible punishment but also as a matter of conscience.

While it is true that God has given us our authority, we also need to go beyond this concept of "bearing the sword". We also need to show love and compassion and act as Jesus did. Consider these scriptures:

Matthew 5: 38 "You have heard that it was said, 'Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth.'[a] 39 But I tell you, do not resist an evil person. If anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to them the other cheek also. 40 And if anyone wants to sue you and take your shirt, hand over your coat as well."

John 13: 12 "When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. "Do you understand what I have done for you?" he asked them. 13 "You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. 14 Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. 15 I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you. 16 Very truly I tell you, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. 17 Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them."

"BE A LEADER AT WORK AND A VOICE OF CHRIST WITH YOUR CO-WORKERS. SHOW COMPASSION EVEN IN THE FACE OF EVIL. PUT ON THE ARMOUR OF GOD." Policing does involve "bearing the sword" but as Christian Police Officers we are also called to servanthood – to put the lives of others before ourselves, even in the face of adversity and opposition. This is our vocation – our calling. We have to balance enforcing the rule of law and showing compassion to our fellow man. We need to lead as examples in that respect. We work with many non-Christians who are critical of a life of faith - but it is our calling to be actively

reforming our vocation to serve the needs of others as God has called us to. Stand firm in the faith. Devote yourself to prayer and reading scripture. Make sure your house is in order. Be a leader at work and a voice of Christ with your co-workers. Show compassion even in the face of evil. Put on the armour of God (Ephesians 6). It is my prayer that as we remember the Reformation, that we examine our own lives and calling and redevote everything we do to the glory of God.





Grace of God and Our Faith & Obedience

There is an uncompromising relationship between the grace of God and our faith and obedience to Him. Scripture says, "*By faith the walls of Jericho fell, after the people had marched around them for seven days*" Hebrews 11:30.

Although their faith had frequently failed in the past, in this instance the children of Israel believed and trusted God and His promises. In doing so they demonstrated "Obedience", knowing full well that whatever they had tried in the past - had failed. As they were saved by faith, so we are today saved by faith (Romans 5:1; John 3:16–18). Yet faith must be evidenced by obedience. The children of Israel had faith - they obeyed, and the walls of Jericho fell "by faith" after they were circled for seven straight days.

"Saving faith impels us to obey God" (Matthew 7:24–29; Hebrews 5:8–9; 1 John 2:3–5). In addition, the story tells us that God keeps His promises (Joshua 6:2, 20). The walls of Jericho fell because God said they would.

God's promises to us today are just as certain. They are just as unswerving. They are exceedingly great and wonderfully precious (Hebrews 6:11–18; 10:36; Colossians 3:24).

Finally, we should learn that faith without works is dead (James 2:26). It is not enough to say, "I believe God," and then

live in an ungodly manner. If we truly believe God, our desire is to obey God. Our faith is put to work. We make every effort to do exactly what God says and keep His commandments. Joshua and the Israelites carried out the commands of God and conquered Jericho. God gave them victory over an enemy that was trying to keep them out of the Promised Land. So it is with us today: if we have true faith, we are compelled to obey God, and God gives us victory over the enemies and obstacles that we face throughout life.

Obedience is the clear evidence of faith. Our faith is the evidence to others that we truly believe in Him. We can conquer and be victorious through life by faith - a faith that obeys the God who gives us that faith as a free gift (Ephesians 2:8–9).

"And what more shall I say? For time will fail me if I tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets, who by faith [that is, with an enduring trust in God and His promises] subdued kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promised blessings, closed the mouths of lions, extinguished the power of [raging] fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became mighty and unbeatable in battle, putting enemy forces to flight." Hebrews 11:32-34

Take time to pray and ask the Holy Spirit to strengthen your inner Faith. You will soon realize the reality and assurance of things yet not seen come to pass.

A Growing Civilian Ministry to Thank and Pray for Police Officers

"Prayer Postcards 4 Police" is a ministry to police officers in Ottawa, Ontario, and Canada (and maybe someday, beyond our borders).

The mission of Prayer Postcards 4 Police is to thank sworn police officers and to invite them to make a prayer request - planting seeds of encouragement for officers to reach out to Christ or to renew their relationship with Him. In turn, my husband Ken and I commit to pray daily for the officer. It is my hope that officers will feel and see a steadily increasing and notable number of expressions of thanks and appreciation.

Ken is the Director of Finance and my partner in this ministry. Together, and along with a growing and dedicated team of volunteers, we have thanked over four hundred officers. We have also discovered that this is a ministry that offers an opportunity for everyone to participate.

Just over a year ago, while on vacation and visiting a church in Barrie Ontario, Rev. Gerry Macmillan (Chaplain to The RCMP, The OPP and The Canadian Legion) left the congregation with seven words, *"When you see them, pray for them."* These same seven words helped to birth the Prayer Postcard 4 Police ministry. After hearing

"WHEN YOU SEE THEM, PRAY FOR THEM."

On the following Tuesday, and under the guidance of The Holy Spirit, at a Christian Bookstore in Barrie Ontario, I purchased one hundred colouring postcards. They are "Postcards of Blessing" by artist Marcel Flier and published by Monarch Books an imprint of Lion Hudson plc. We use fourteen of these postcard patterns. Six postcards have scripture on the front and eight do not.

As the Postcards are coloured, police officers are prayed for. Each Postcard is unique and can represent up to three hours of prayer for police officers. A note of thanks and appreciation is written on the back of the Prayer Postcard along with an invitation for the officer to mail an enclosed page with their prayer request to our home. A selfaddressed, stamped envelope is included as well.

The first six prayer Postcards were handed out on Parliament Hill in early September 2016. Delivering these first Prayer Postcards was a complete act of obedience and a test of trust. To our surprise, a month later, at The Ottawa Civic Prayer Breakfast, an officer read a Prayer

about some of the challenges officers face, and as I left the church that day, my heart was strangely and strongly broken for police officers. I have no police officers in my family and have not had any officers within my circle of friends.

Postcard from the platform also stating this was exactly what he needed. This was confirmation that the ministry was fulfilling God's purpose.

As Ken and I move throughout the city and province, like most people, we see police officers at work. We stop to thank them and to deliver a Prayer Postcard 4 Police. We attend police events throughout the city in order to deliver thanks and appreciation to officers. We carry several Prayer Postcards with us at all times. Recently, we realized that we can be recognized by officers we approach, who now say they have seen our Prayer Postcards in their cruisers and at their police stations.

The prayers of the individuals that colour and pray, along with the hand written note and personal presentation of the Prayer Postcards is a critical and much appreciated characteristic of the ministry. The reaction of officers to receiving one is always surprise and they frequent comment about how rare it is to hear a "thank you". They are frequently quite emotional. We always open and unpack the unsealed envelope together. It is special to know that at a later time, when they are alone, they will pause to actually read the thank you and receive the invitation to prayer. Many officers have sent prayer requests to our home. They are emotional, touching and at times heart wrenching. I pray daily for each and every officer who has send me a prayer request.

God has opened many doors


On occasion there have been officers that request a few Prayer Postcards to hand out to fellow officers who they feel would be receptive, and benefit from a note of thanks and invitation to prayer. On three or four occasions we have chosen to leave a Prayer Postcard on a cruiser's windshield.

We have recently had the honour of preparing and delivering congratulatory Prayer Postcards to a troop of RCMP Cadets at Depot. It is wonderful to think that these Prayer Postcards have been dispersed throughout the county with the officers as they take up their posts in all the various parts of Canada.

As of Mother's Day 2017, we began including an invitation for family members of police officers to make Prayer requests. A summary of what we pray about for officers (pictured below) is now distributed to officers along with the Prayer Postcard.

If we haven't had the honour to speak to you yet, be assured that whenever we see you, we pray for you, and that we are persuading others to do the same. It is my greatest hope that this ministry can create a paradigm shift in the public's audible voice, moving toward greater and greater respect and appreciation for police officers.



In Service

I first discovered the Fellowship of Christian Peace Officers when I was volunteering at Missions Fest 2017. As I was there all weekend, by the time that I had stopped to speak with Ron Mostrey, he was engaged in prayer with a gentleman. I later learned the man had been a cadet at the RCMP's Training Academy (Depot), a couple years earlier but had to terminate his training due to a family situation. He wanted to know who to contact or where to go to re-activate his application, as the family situation was no longer an issue. Ron didn't have the exact answers. They just finished praying for God' to assist, and there I was already standing there!

As he stepped back, I introduced myself and told him I worked in "E" Division Headquarters. I knew a couple of people in recruiting and could complete some queries. By having faith in God, he was provided with the answers he was looking for,

and he made application again. I remembered that having faith in God when you pray and believe that you will receive - you shall receive. In addition, we are all servants of God, and God may call upon us to assist with his work.

Jesus was a servant to all - did he not feed the hungry, heal the sick and raise the dead? In many of the bible teachings, Jesus provided parables to illustrate the way for us to understand and follow in his ways. In 2 Corinthians 4:5, we read: *for we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake.* As peace officers, we have been tasked with enforcing the laws of man; yet as Christians, we are to be servants of Jesus Christ. Often, we and our faith will be tested.

Over the past 29 plus years in policing, I have seen many events that caused me to lose my faith. The violent acts, the abuse towards others and directed at me. My work became my life, with extra shifts, the calls in the middle of the night and the longer hours took a toll on my faith and my family. Looking back, I can see I was having troubles dealing with the financial pressures living in the Lower Mainland, the lack of sleep, my daughter's illness

and the divide that had formed between myself and my wife. Everything came crashing down when my wife left and I was there with my six-year-old daughter. About two weeks later, she came and said she was taking my daughter and wanted a divorce. I wish that I could say that it got better, but it didn't as the custody and divorce needed to be settled. There were times when I would find myself at work in tears. I returned to my church and faced many people who didn't approve of my divorce. Again, I shied away from my faith and focused on my daughter for the alternating weeks that I had her. Later, I started dating and found a woman who had a compassionate heart and cared for elderly people many of whom were forgotten by their own families.

Our relationship grew. We had many different challenges, from cancer to recovering from a motorcycle accident. We were both raised in faith-filled homes, but she followed one Christian faith and I followed another. Given we didn't get a welcoming reception from some people at my church and her church was too far to travel to, we looked for a new place to worship. Walking through the doors of a local church and being welcomed like a lost child, resulted in us finding our new home church. My faith and journey back to a faith-filled life began.


We have an opportunity to reach out amongst ourselves and to others and show that we can be servants of God. Maybe within your work and life, you were there because God needed you to be his servant and complete his work.

I kept in touch with the gentleman from Missions Fest and learned that he did not pass a component of his medical examination and would need a minor surgery before he would be able to return to his childhood dream career. Again, I trust that God will lead this man's future path.

I am pleased to be the new provincial representative for FCPO in BC. I am excited by the possibilities for membership growth in our province. Now more than ever, this ministry is needed to encourage and support

Today I am reflecting on the tragic events that recently occurred in Las Vegas and Edmonton. In particular, the <u>Edmonton</u> <u>incident</u> where an officer was viciously attacked and left without

assistance while bystanders just walked by and away from the area. It has reminded me of the call each one of us answers every day when we put on our uniform and go into work. I have heard the verse John 15:13 "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" used in reference to law enforcement regularly, but there is more to what Jesus is saying here than just the willingness to put ourselves in harm's way to save the life of another.

There is no doubt that Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice for all of humanity through His death on a cross, and if you look at the whole of Jesus' life you will see how He laid down His life in so many other ways as well, prior to, and leading up to, making that one last earthly sacrifice. The primary act of taking on the form of man and not using His authority during His time on earth to serve His own needs, but the needs of His Father, must have carried its own set of burdens every day.

The fact that Jesus stood on the truth that He came to share, despite being challenged by His own people, including His own family, must have hurt Him deeply. Even holding all the knowledge of the evils around Him, yet not being able to get others to understand the complexities of that truth because of their own blindness, must have been frustrating beyond expression. As peace officers, we will never be able to achieve the same level of sacrifice as our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, but He does set the perfect example for us to follow. I am close to finishing my fourth year as a sworn Correctional Peace Officer and one of the major changes I have noticed in myself is how I feel when I am out attending a large public event. Although not paranoid of danger, I feel I am more alert of the goings on around me. I also feel the need to be aware of dangers to run towards, not away from, should a fellow law enforcement officer be in need of assistance.

I believe that every law enforcement officer lives by this standard if they truly accept the responsibilities of their calling, and as a result, it pains me to see examples where a fellow officer (or even the general public) is in need of help and there is no one running towards them to offer it.



In response to the Edmonton attack I find myself grateful for those who I stand alongside every day. I am thankful that they lay down their lives in so many ways every day in order to protect and serve. I pray that when the burdens of your calling lay heavy on you that you will turn to each other for support and prayer as well as turn to our perfect example of Jesus for encouragement and understanding. Thank you to each one of you for everything you do.
